Levinson, Wilson At Odds Over Calcium Chloride Policy

A resolution making discontinuance of the Blossfield Township highway department's policy of spreading calcium chloride on the roads of Blossfield Hills village and individuals in the township was the occasion for a bitter verbal tiff at the township board meeting Monday between David Levinson, now member of the board, and E. Wilson, township highway commissioner.

The resolution aimed for lack of a second motion, but only after Mr. Levinson had declared he did not "believe the township should be in that business" because he felt it belonged to him rather than a profit.

Morris To Run For County Prosecutor

Mr. Morris, Ferndale attorney, this week announced his candidacy for prosecuting attorney of Oakland County on the Democratic ticket. Mr. Morris has practiced law for eight and a half years in Ferndale as a member of the firm of Morris and Claffield. The object of prosecuting attorney, being the chief law enforcement unit of this country, should be absolutely free from political strife, group antagonism or personal grievances. Mr. Morris declared, "and the candidate to be selected to fill such office, in order that he might properly fulfill the duties and obligations thereof, should also be free from all alliances with groups or individuals who place their personal desires on political ambition above the interests and welfare of the taxpayers of this county."

"If given the honor of being elected prosecuting attorney I pledge myself to conduct the affairs of this office without fear or favor and in a fair, impartial, economical and businesslike manner, remembering always that the public office is a public trust and should be so regarded."

Mr. Morris was educated in the public schools and in the Pierce College of Philadelphia. He studied law and received his degree at the Detroit College of Law. He is a member of the Presbyterian Church and of Sejourne Lodge No. 483, F. and A. M. Detroit.

Mr. Morris delivered the keynote address at the Oakland County Democratic convention in Pontiac last spring and was a delegate to both the state and national Democratic conventions.

CHLORINE SYSTEM CLEANSSES ROUSE

Decreased Pollution Evident, But Supreme Test Is Yet To Come

The chlorination system installed last spring at the sewage disposal plant has shown decreased evidence of pollution in the River Rouge. The city manager James W. Pary reported to the Commission Monday.

Mr. Pary said that the system had not yet been put to a severe test because of the fact that there has been so much rainfall that some less need of chlorination in the last few months. He stated that in operation to date the chlorination of highly satisfactory results.

The system, which was installed on recommendation of the Michigan Stream Control Commission, an insistence of the Birmingham Golf Club along with property the Rouge had become polluted, has been thus far successful in that it has kept the water clear of about 20 pounds of chlorine a day. Mr. Pary reported. Representatives of the Stream Control Commission inspecting the system last week and were quite well pleased with it.

Operation of the system supervised by Village Engineer Harold H. Gosson, who checks its efficiency with daily readings of the sewage and effluent flow.

Chairwarmers' Club To Give Vaudeville

An annual vaudeville, the recent vaudeville performance of the Pontiac members of the Chairwarmers' Club, will be held at the Masonic Temple in Pontiac Aug. 31. The organization, which has about 250 members in every corner of the country, is an amusement project for cripples. The members correspond with one another by means of radio broadcasting sets of their own. The Monte code is used in their correspondence.

About four years ago, Walt J. Colpus of Pontiac, a bedridden amateur radio fan, conceived the idea of becoming acquainted with other cripples by means of short-wave radio correspondence. He developed the plan to its present status, the National Chairwarmers' Club with members throughout the nation. Mr. Colpus is now secretary of the organization.

The club has a monthly newspaper of its own, and the Michigan chapter has its own magazine, "Sant-in-anywhere, who are interested in joining the group, may have a booklet of information on "How to Become a Radio Amateur" by ordering from the club secretary.
