## Prominent Saginaw Furrier Dies Here

G. F. Oppermann, prominent Saginaw furrier, died of a pulmonary hemorrhage, at 3:30 P. M. Monday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. John T. Edgerly of Adams road.

Mr. and Mrs. Oppermann had been visiting here since June 5, and had planned to return to Saginaw Tuesday.

Mr. Oppermann, a charter member of the Saginaw Furrier Club and a former president of the Saginaw Board of Education, was 68 years old, and was born in New York City.

Surviving, besides Mrs. Edgerly and the widow, are five sons, Robert of Memphis, Tenn.; Eugene of Milwaukee, Wis.; Arthur, Kirk and Paul of Saginaw, and six grandchildren.

The body was removed to the Kimball-Bailey Funeral Home and later to Saginaw for burial.

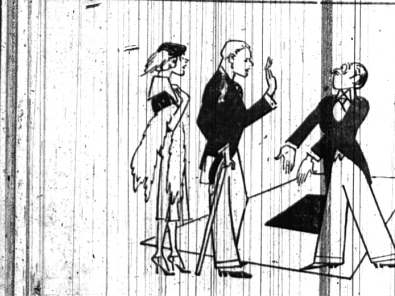

## Baccalaureate, Commencement Services Honor Cranbrook, Kingswood Students



Dr. W. O. Stevens Pleads For New Values

Substitution of some of the older standards of value and principles of conduct for the goals of materialism worshipped with disastrous results by the past generation was urged by Dr. W. O. Stevens, headmaster of Cranbrook School, in his address to the 31 graduating seniors of the school at commencement exercises held Monday morning in Christ Church Cranbrook.

"The highway of the 20th century is literally strewn with the ugly fragments of our mistakes," Dr. Stevens declared in pleading for a rejection of former ideals, among which he named "imperialism," "mass production and industrialism," "success measured in terms of money," and "organization."

Imperialism and the rivalry of nations he blamed for the World War; mass production, he claimed, opened the gates to millions of impoverished and suffering slaves; and to Keith Hamilton, president of the junior class.

"But now when we read the names of those to whom our corrupt politicians lend support," he said, "when we read the names of the hundreds of gangsters in our newspapers, we wonder whether that 'meeting pot' has raised anything but an ugly scum."

The goal of monetary success, he continued, has brought about "smart methods in politics, smart new deals in business," and intimidated "this smartness has gone too far."

"Then," he said, "we worshipped what to me was a highly commendable god of organization."

## OWNER TO SUE IN DOG'S DEATH

Will Ask \$500 For St. Bernard Killed By Postman's Car

A suit was expected to be filed in Circuit Court this week against Fred A. Ruffe, 1164 East Riffner road, a letter carrier, asking \$500 damages for a dog struck and killed by Ruffe's car on Adams road Wednesday night of last week.

The dog, a four-year-old St. Bernard named Barry Bon Neeshing, was the leading dog in the kennels of W. F. Robinson, 728 S. Adams road, and was valued by its owner at \$2,000.

It had been brought to this country from Switzerland at the age of six months and had been in the possession of the Robinson kennels for the past two and a half years. It had just begun to build up a reputation as one of the leading St. Bernards in the state, Mrs. Robinson said, and was the subject of an article in the latest issue of the American Kennel Gazette.

The dog was killed almost instantly when it was struck by Ruffe's car after running out onto the pavement.

## Marquis Pins Hope On Youth

Confidence in the youth of today to put forth courage and perseverance sufficient to correct the social and economic evils caused by the selfishness and greed of their elders was expressed by Dr. S. S. Marquis, rector of Christ Church Cranbrook, in his baccalaureate sermon to members of the graduating classes of Cranbrook and Kingswood schools in the church Sunday morning.

Basing his message on the biblical proverb, "The fathers have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge," Dr. Marquis maintained that the present is the inheritor of the past and that preceding generations alone are to blame for the ills of contemporary civilization.

"Much has been said and written today about youth and its disregard of the old standards of living and customs," Dr. Marquis said, "and much of the blame for the breakdown that has come is placed upon the youth. To hear some people, you can almost hear the crumbling of the foundations under our moral, social, and religious structures due to some evil influence emanating from boys and girls, about 20 years of age!"

Refers To War

"It is an assumption utterly absurd and foundationless. What is happening today would not have happened had not the generations of the past, including that older generation to which I belong, set the stage upon which this drama is taking place."

He pointed to the World War as a bitter example of what has happened about youth and its disregard about by older people, the burden of which their children were forced to bear.

"It was the fathers who ate the sour grapes and the children's teeth were set on edge," he said, "and that has been true for the whole of history." Dr. Marquis declared, "Almos invariably has been called upon youth to go out and settle in some way the missions of the fathers, putting upon youth the sacrifices for the past."

Can Change The Play

"But it is not necessary for you to play in a mechanistic way the part that Fate seems to have assigned to you," he continued. "You can change the play now if you want to. You can start the story of the play. You can give it a new and unexpected ending. God is playing a part in it, and through you. I have every reason to believe that you will alter the trend of the story which we older people have been trying to write as history."

You have appeared on the world's stage at a critical moment. Through you what seemed to be a tragedy, I have reason to believe will be turned into a drama of more hope and promise for the rest of us than our fathers had."
