

### GIRLS TO ATTEND DAVIS LAKE CAMP

40 From Birmingham Plan Stay At County Girl Scout Site

Attracted by the woods, lakes and grassy knolls of the naturally picturesque site at Davis Lake near Lapeer, more than 40 Birmingham girls, a slightly larger number than last year, are planning to attend the Oakland County Girl Scout Summer Camp which opens July 3, according to Mrs. Shaw B. Baldwin, treasurer of the Birmingham Girl Scout Council.

The camp, supported by the Pontiac council, will be divided into four periods, two of two weeks and two of one week each. The last period is scheduled to end Aug. 14. The Birmingham Council has pledged \$200 a year to aid in supporting the camp.

The Council tries by various means to raise money for this institution, and each year stages a garden party in one of the large gardens of Birmingham or vicinity. This year the party will be on June 15 in the garden of Mrs. Seymour Adams of Adams road. Activities of the camp, designed to teach the principles of better citizenship include archery, boating, handicrafts, nature study, swimming, out-of-door cooking, Red Cross life saving, first class mapping and judging, singing, dramatics, story-telling, woodcraft, pioneering, hiking and tracking.

The camp is located within an hour and a quarter's drive from Birmingham, and is easily accessible.

### Golf And Young People Help To Sustain "Dad" Stanton's Interest In Life At 83

"The man who refuses to be set back by his old days always achieves more than the moody cuss to whom every difficulty is a calamity. It is really a matter of the size of a man's vision of the big game of life. Little men stumble over little obstacles and a shallow note is disturbed by a small breeze."

Those few words, written in a letter to his son several years ago, sum up some of the principal divisions in the philosophy of one Robert T. Stanton, known as "Dad" to scores of friends in Birmingham and to hundreds in diverse quarters of the United States, whose personality and energy even at the age of 83 make it impossible to identify him conclusively either by address or occupation.

### COLLECTION WORK BIDS ARE SOUGHT

Commission Overrules Parry In Action On Garbage Disposal Service

The village will advertise for bids on garbage collection this year just as it has in the past, was decided by the Commission Tuesday night in rejecting recommendation of Village Manager Parry that the lease of Perley Carr, the present collector be renewed without hesitation when it expires on July 1.

Mr. Parry highly commended Carr's work and expressed the doubt that advertising for bids would procure a collector who would be willing to do it any cheaper. Carr charges his clients 80 cents a month for two collections a week the year round, and 40 cents a month for two collections a week in the summer and one in the winter. He was granted the lease last year after several rival bidders for the work had objected on the grounds that satisfactory bids could not be had for that figure.

Commissioner Lawrence Hulbert advised that the bid be taken nevertheless, in order "to avoid any possible criticism," and Commissioner Maurice Lowman added that "it is the only fair thing to do."

The bids will be taken for both one and two-year periods. Fruits having small acid content are melons, bananas, custards, blackberries and pears.


