Hucksters Barred From Main Roads

Terrific Legislature Against Vendors On Woodward, Square Lake, Telegraph

The Bloomfield Township Board at a meeting Monday afternoon adopted a resolution to prohibit roadside hucksters from selling their wares within the highway limits of Woodward avenue, Square Lake and Telegraph roads.

Heard before the Board to enter an objection against roadside stands near his place of business. He claimed they were a nuisance and a traffic hazard.

The Board had previously made a study of the problem, and the resolution was adopted on the advice of Floyd Blackless, township attorney, who said in his opinion the state laws gave the Board power only to designate roads in the township where vendors could not operate.

An ordinance making it prohibitive for hucksters to sell their wares on any highway could be adopted only at a meeting of the entire township, he said.

REPLIES MADE BY ATHERTON

Author of Business Revival Plan Answers Readers' Queries

(The author of the following communications is Clarence D. Atherton, 1511 Baldwin avenue, who recently completed a plan for overcoming economic distress. The plan is published in the issue from May 28 to June 21 in last week's issue several questions pertaining to the plan were addressed to Mr. Atherton. The communications below contain Mr. Atherton's answers to these questions.)

To the Editor: The letters addressed to The Eccentric concerning my plan for general recovery have been greatly appreciated. Appended below are brief replies to the several questions propounded by their correspondents. To conserve space the term Special Merchandise Currency has been abbreviated to "S. M. C."

Question: "Suppose the wage earner sees fit to hoard his S. M. C. until, for example he has money for a down payment on a car. How will this help recovery?"

In such cases the "promptness" of recovery would not be helped. However, a motor car is about the only article of merchandise the purchase of which might cause such a circumstance. In the American custom, whenever possible, to use and enjoy an article while paying for it, and most articles require but a small initial payment. Should there prove to be many such cases, alert merchants (including motor car dealers) could reduce them to a minimum by offering special inducements, such as paying interest on S. M. C. deposited with them against future delivery of merchandise.

Question: "In the case of a general store, who (outside of the customer and storekeeper) could loan whether merchandise from Group A or Group B was purchased with S. M. C.?"

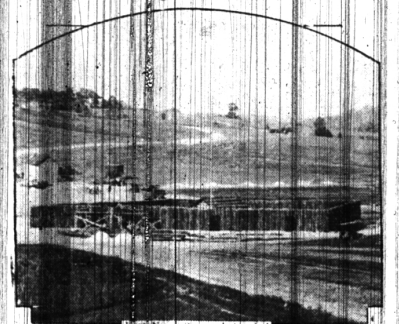
Answer: Inasmuch as illegal use would constitute a serious federal offense for both buyer and seller, it would be too risky to attempt except in one-man stores and by comparatively few individuals. Furthermore, in most cases "the game would not be worth the candle." Many evasions are to be expected, but simply could not be so widespread and general as to render the plan barren of results. It should be noted that even total failure of this plan would leave conditions no worse than before. Advocates of huge bond issues might weigh this phase of the question.

Question: "Would the plan be constitutional?"

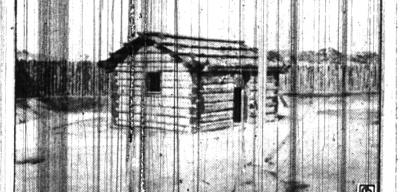

Local Interest Centers On Dedication of Famous Fort

Birmingham Men Evolve Landscaping Program For Reconstructed Pennsylvania Site Where Washington Fought First Battle

More than customary interest and importance attached to the dedication next Sunday and Monday of reconstructed Fort Necessity, 12 miles from Uniontown, Pa., where George Washington, then an Army captain, fought his first battle with the French 178 years ago.

For three Birmingham men have been intimately connected with plans for the reconstruction project. One is C. DeForest Platt, of 156 Worth street, landscape architect, who drew the design for the elaborate landscaping program involving an expenditure of thousands of dollars, planned for the site.

The other two are C. C. and S. C. Robinson, of the seriousness of the emergency would justify war-time treatment of memorial legislation.
