

C. K. BRAUNS, 49, DIES IN CHICAGO

Prominent Detroit Advertising Man Formerly Lived in Birmingham

Funeral services were held in Chicago Wednesday morning for C. K. Brauns, former Birmingham resident and prominent Detroit advertising man, who died Monday after an illness of several months. He was 49 years old.
