CONFER JUNIOR STUDENT AWARDS

Outstanding Pupils And High Scholastic Averages Win Recognition

Final honor assemblies and graduation exercises were held by the three junior high schools Friday. Both Barnum and Adams School Student Councils announced the names of one boy and one girl who have been outstand-

ing the past year, and 12 students were awarded scholarship certificates for high grades. The Adams scholarship awards were made to Lucile Hallist, Mary Sturges, Rita Wood and Nancy Strickling, while Betty Brining, James Martinale, Thomas Navin and Horroben Stauber were given the Baldwin awards. The Barnum council gave certificates to Jane Long, Marjorie Tate, Betty Jane McCormick, Florence Smith and Wilma Ward.

Franklyn Phillips and Marjorie Tate were selected as the outstanding pupils of the year at Barnum and their names will be engraved on the permanent honor plaque. The names to be engraved on the Adams plaque are Lucile Hallist and James Schostky. The classes of 1931 and 1932 at Adams presented a 16-mile-long moving picture projector to the school.

Names Of Brien, Harris Inscribed On Johnson Memorial Tablet

Amid appropriate ceremonies, the George F. Johnson Memorial Trophy, honoring the late football coach and athletic director of Baldwin High School, was formally presented to the school at an assembly program Friday afternoon.

Each year the trophy will be inscribed with the name of Baldwin's outstanding student and athlete, selected by a committee composed of representatives of organizations sponsoring the award. Believing it fitting to select a member of one of Mr. Johnson's own teams to receive the honor, the committee nominated James "Baby" Brien, Baldwin graduate of a year ago, for the citation.

Brien was one of the Maroon and White leaders on the football field for three years, and was one of two sophomores to gain a varsity "B" in the sport in 1928. He wound up his record by gaining an honorable mention on Birmingham's All-State team as a senior, besides finishing his career in excellent scholastic standing.

Brien's name was engraved on the Johnson trophy first, just above Harris'. Members of the selecting committee for the award this year included Mrs. Johnson, E. T. Engel, athletic director; Miss Ethel Hughes of the Baldwin faculty; Dr. N. Weir Burkhardt of the Loon Club; Melvin C. Hart, principal; and Dale McClelland of the Varsity Club.

The assembly program also saw the conferring of special awards on John McKee and James Shine for breaking state broad jump records; presentation of awards to the six members of the Baldwin breaking state broad jump records; conferring of certificates to students who appeared in the honor roll during the past year.

He then told how he left Leslie on the advice of a former professor at the University of Michigan who recommended that he attempt to find a position in a growing suburban community where his talents at building up a modern school system would be tested to the limit.

"I am highly grateful to that first School Board which gave me the opportunity to come to Birmingham," he said, "but especially to one man who gave me invaluable guidance and assistance during those first few years, I refer to R. J. Corvill—my beloved friend and careful advisor."

Mr. Corvill and Mr. Shain (the Mr. Harris) were both members of that first Board.

Continuing, Mr. Vliet said: "It is a tribute to the wisdom of the people of Birmingham that they have supported their School Boards in a broad program of planning and building which has resulted in the present school system."
