

# Baldwin Swimmers Take 4 First Places Fordson Contest

## FORDSON DEFEATS MAPLE TANKMEN

Result of Medley Relay, Final Event, Deedes Outcome, 35 To 29

Despite its taking four first places, the Baldwin High School tank team met defeat at the hands of a strong Fordson squad last Thursday at Fordson, 35 to 29. The teams were evenly matched throughout, the outcome of the meet depending on the final event, the medley relay, which the Fordson trio captured by inches.

Captain John Botting remained undefeated in dual competition by taking the 220-yard free style event with ease. He led the second place swimmer by more than 25 yards, and was not even called upon to stage a final sprint. Even so, his time was faster than that of last season. He also swam in the winning free style relay and in the medley relay.

Bill Lynch placed first in the fancy diving with points to spare. Jack Hogan, not yet fully recovered from his recent illness, added the fourth first place to Baldwin's score in the 40 yard free style. The 100-yard dash was a full second slower than his usual time, but he was able to finish only thirty seconds behind.

## Program Of Peace Outlined To Forum

Atkins Lists Nine Points In Proposal Of Great Peace Groups

A program for the creation and maintenance of peace as formulated by the great peace groups of the United States was outlined to the Methodist Men's Forum Sunday morning by Rev. R. M. Atkins. The peace program contains as its salient points:

1. U. S. to stand by peaceful methods.
2. Withdraw nationals from danger zones of belligerent nations.
3. Withdraw military and naval forces from danger zones.
4. Refuse to allow munition makers to sell to belligerent nations.
5. Refuse to allow loans to belligerent nations.
6. Give immediate humanitarian relief for individuals in the stricken areas.
7. Maintain the open door policy.
8. Require indemnity for damages to the nationals.
9. Co-operate with the League of Nations and the U. S. S. R. to achieve the above program.

Mr. Atkins declared that the Department of State of the United States has informed him at his request, that it is the purpose of the United States to use peaceful means in its relations with the Japanese-Chinese situation.

Surrounding a subject, introducing a new series, will be "Youth And Modern Amusements." F. Morse Cooke, principal of Adams school, and William Dalee, Sr., will lead the discussion.
