

BILKOVSKY AND BINGHAM WIN

Southfield Supervisor Candidates Poll Big Majorities; Other Races Close

George Bingham, Republican incumbent, will face Charles Bilkovsky, Democrat, in the annual Southfield Township election in April as the result of the primaries last Monday when both candidates won their nominations by substantial majorities.

Bingham polled 298 votes, or half again as many as his two Republican opponents together. Joseph B. McClelland received 136 and Dean S. Saxton 49.

Bilkovsky was given 71 votes, nearly twice as many as his only opponent for the Democratic nomination, August A. Miller, who received 36.

Results of the voting for other offices were much less decisive. Candidates for clerk, highway commissioner, justice of the peace, Board of Review and constable were all nominated by narrow majorities.

Mrs. Fanny Adams, incumbent Republican treasurer, was unopposed for the nomination, and polled 387 votes.

JUSTICE FINDS 36 GUILTY IN MONTH

Buck Convicts 18 On Birmingham, 18 On Bloomfield Hills Ordinances

Eighteen defendants, including two charged with drunk driving, four with disorderly conduct, six with speeding, four with reckless driving and two with violating traffic signals, were found guilty of violating Birmingham village ordinances by Justice Floyd S. Buck during February, according to his monthly report.

They paid fines totalling \$294.80, and costs amounting to \$84. Judge Buck also convicted 18 defendants for violating Bloomfield Hills ordinances during the month. These included seven charged with drunk driving, nine with disorderly conduct and two with speeding. Two were sentenced to county jail terms, and the others paid fines and costs aggregating \$585.
