POLICE PATROL STATE PROBED

Commission Discusses Regulation of Private Watchmen Corps Here

The question of whether or not private police patrols should be allowed to operate in Birmingham, and if so, what regulations the village should impose, was the subject of a brisk and lengthy discussion on Monday night by members of the Village Commission.

The discussion arose out of the reading of an opinion drawn up by Mr. Ogden in which he declared the state law, which requires private police patrols to post a bond for a license with the state, is in conflict with the local ordinance, which requires a \$5,000 surety bond to be posted with the village before a license will be granted.

Defines Terms The state statute expressly provides that private detectives should not be required by municipalities to secure any but a state license. The opinion was drawn up around the case of the Oakland Residential Police, now in the West Maple road district, which Mr. Ogden defined as private watchmen, and therefore not covered by the state law.

Warwick Stanton, head of the Oakland Residential Police, had called the Commission's attention to this law after announcing his inability to secure a surety bond and being refused a renewal of his license.

During the discussion, Commissioners Frank S. Packard and Maurice Lowman questioned the right of the village to regulate a police patrol any more than a private watchman.

The other argued it should be regulated much as any business to which anything of a hazardous nature connected, but questioned whether any such patrol should be allowed to operate.

Commissioner Packard later agreed the business needed some supervision from the village. "I'm satisfied the business needs

regulation," he said, "but I believe it should be made possible for a responsible man to operate such a business here if people care to make use of it."

Mr. Ogden was asked to investigate the feasibility of the amount of the bond required, and perhaps asking for only a personal cash bond rather than a surety bond.

(Continued from Page 1, Part 3) ever, for grading and will be surfaced as soon as the grading is properly settled and finances are available.

"As regards the section through Birmingham, which is proposed to follow the old Grand Trunk right-of-way, the first efforts of the department have been to negotiate with the industries located along the route relative to transfer of location along the new Grand Trunk where railway facilities would be available."

"I believe that at this time all such industries have been contacted and negotiations partially completed. As a result, agreements have also been reached with some of the other property interests along this route. Negotiations will first have to be completed with the industries and then with other property interests. The right-of-way complete will take some little time.

Funds Not Available "It is the department's intention to start construction as soon after the right-of-way is cleared as finances will be available. It is considered that finances will not be available during 1932, owing to the winter program started about Oct. 1, 1931 by the department and carried on through the winter, which involved a total expenditure from 1932 funds of approximately eleven and a half million dollars, which leaves about three million dollars for the balance of 1932.

"Preparatory to a normal 1932 program the department graded many miles of road during 1931 to allow for proper settlement of grade to take place before surfacing in 1932. The winter program involved grading and structures, which program added additional mileage to that already graded. At the present time there are approximately 438 miles of such grades in the state and the money available will not suffice more than about 125 to 150 miles. It is considered that the department's first obligation out of money still left in 1932 estimated funds will be to surface as much of this grade as possible.

The right-of-way for the location along the Grand Trunk through Birmingham is figured for 200 foot width. If a separation with Maple street is decided upon, there would be a participation required by the village under the Dyckerhoff bill, which would amount to 5 per cent of the cost of the separation. There would be no participation by the village on the paving, unless pavement would be widened to greater width than outside the limits. The construction of a super-highway following the old Grand Trunk location through Birmingham is a project of considerable magnitude. The right-of-way difficulties to be encountered are of such nature that reasonable cooperation by all property owners, will be necessary. The spirit of willingness of the people of Birmingham to co-operate in this project in a reasonable way with the department will undoubtedly help considerably in getting the right-of-way cleared and the preliminaries completed ready for construction to begin."

(Continued from Page 2, Part 3) pany, entered into in 1928. Some help in this connection have been made by the Edison Company and negotiations are pending for a further modification of this contract.

With these exceptions further budget reductions of any consequence would necessitate serious curtailment or complete elimination of our health services, fire and police protection, and maintenance of public streets, sewers and other important services, which would be a dangerous procedure. The present tentative 1932 budget was adopted after exhaustive study and extended informal committee meetings of the Commission, Village manager, and other interested citizens. It represents, I think, the best composite judgment of the Commission and has the approval in general of the committee of Property Owners who worked on the budget with the Commission and manager.

The balancing of the needs and desires of the residents and protection against the reduced revenue provided, is a very difficult problem. It represents, I think, the best composite judgment of the Commission and has the approval in general of the committee of Property Owners who worked on the budget with the Commission and manager.

Public sessions Chapter IX, Section 7, of the Village Charter provides: "All sessions of the Commission are to be open to the municipality should be public."

I believe that this provision can and should be better observed exactly in accordance with the meaning and intent of this provision, and the Commission should continue to provide full opportunity, in its regular sessions, for the presentation of all matters of property owners in connection with the business. The customary practice of so-called committees of village officials and other interested parties to discuss matters of this nature together occasionally for study and information regarding various proposals, is not sufficient to make a free public discussion of such matters at all Commission sessions, as required by the Charter.

The city-village officials should again under discussion and I understand that an able committee of property owners is making a study of the matter in the light of possible changes in state law, and all conditions since the last village vote on this issue. I am entirely open-minded about this matter and await with interest the finding of the committee as to what will be for our best interests. No action can be taken on this question by the Village Commission until a petition by the necessary number of electors has been filed with the Commission, as required by law.
