MAPLES WIN 2 TOURNAMENT TILTS

Beat Hazel Park, Rochester In Regional; Lose To St. Joseph's

Winning two of its three tilts in the Class B regional basketball tournament at Rochester last weekend, the Maroon and White quintet of Baldwin High School placed third among the six teams to complete its 1932 season.

A trophy awarded by the Rochester High School Activity Association was presented to the Birmingham team for sportsmanship.

The locals played their best game Saturday against Hazel Park, administering an easy 29 to 14 drubbing to the latter and averting themselves for the 27 to 25 defeat suffered at the Parkers' hands earlier in the season.

McBride, Maple forward, was the high-point man, with four field goals and a free throw. Hunt's defensive work at guard was also commendable, but, for that matter, the entire team played excellent basketball.

Birmingham took an early lead in the first period and held it throughout the game. Sampson, Hazel Park diminutive forward, grabbed scoring honors for the losers with nine points.

Baldwin Swimmers Place Fourth In State 'B' Meet

Botting, Hogan, Lynch, Both Relay Teams Account For 14 Points

Placing two swimmers, a diver and both relay teams, the Baldwin High School swimming team took fourth place in the Class B division of the state meet held at Lansing last Friday and Saturday.

River Rouge captured the division championship with 39 points. Ypsilanti Central, the defending champion, was second with 33, and University High of Ann Arbor third with 28. Baldwin scored the same number of points, as last year, 14.

Captain John Botting repeated his feat of last season by easily taking second in the 220-yard freestyle event. Clayton Mains, of River Rouge, broke the Class A as well as the Class B record to defeat him. Botting's time was, incidentally, but a fraction of a second behind that of the leading Class A swimmer's mark.

Captain Hogan swam the fastest race to take second in the 100-yard freestyle, Mains winning this event also. Hogan failed by one-tenth of a second to qualify for the 50-yard freestyle sprint, in which he placed second last year.
