Cites Delinquency
Speaking of the reductions in general, he said:

"I fully appreciate the criticism I am opening myself to in recommending reductions in the salaries of teachers, who, according to government statistics, are, as a class, paid 30 percent less than the average wage earner.

"In all my experience as an educator I have never before been in the position of recommending such reductions. But at the same time, I have never before been in a position where only 40 percent of the school taxes were collected.

Bishop Sees All Wedlocks As Only "Trial" Marriages

Bishop John F. Noll was born in Ft. Wayne, Ind., Jan. 25, 1875. He is a graduate of St. Lawrence College, Wisconsin, and has received numerous honorary degrees. He was ordained a Roman Catholic priest in 1898, and was pastor at Kendallville, Ind., from 1899 to 1904. He has been pastor of various churches throughout Indiana. On June 30, 1925, he was consecrated Bishop of Ft. Wayne, Ind. Some of his publications are "Kind Words From Your Pastor," "The New Instruction Jackson," and "The Faithful Argument."

FOR MANY years nearly all marriages in this country have been, as far as the state is concerned, "trial marriages."

Divorce is one of the most flagrant evils of the day, and it is the result of disorderly society, a result of which, after severing the most sacred of all bonds, clears the way for adulterous unions.

Three judges and courts are officially commissioned to separate husband and wife from a trial marriage. Yet the marriage certificate issued by county clerks still refer to the union as "holy matrimony."

People were horrified a few years ago when a Denver jurist advocated "trial marriages." Between the breakable marriage, with which we are familiar, and the one which could be used together, thus making available a 12-month probation plan by offering monthly tax anticipation certificates to sale during the first half of the year, and accepting the monthly installment payments from July 1 to Dec. 31.

Bank Support Needed
The third plan, intended to establish a systematic savings plan for taxpayers, would involve the co-operation of local banks which would accept deposits on a definite schedule and release them directly to the village treasurer for tax payments on July 1.

Interest rates on the deposits would be paid by the banks just as in Christmas Club projects. The village would have no proprietary interest in the deposits before they have been received in payment of taxes, and likewise would assume no liability for them.

"These three plans should make the prompt payment of taxes exceptionally easy for any person who does not actually desire to default," said Mr. Noonan in concluding his statements to the commission.

Would Curb Delinquency
"The justiciary of the institution lies in the belief that they would in some measure accomplish the twofold purpose sought:

1. Reduce the borrowing requirements in the first six months of each fiscal year.
2. Curb delinquency on the part of those who have grown into the installment payment habit. I believe this includes the majority of the American public today."

Attorney's Mother Dies in Ontario

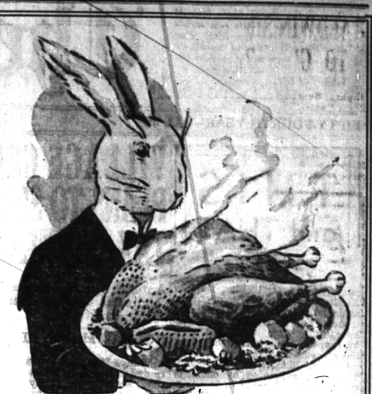
Services Held Here Thursday For Mrs. Katherine Atkinson

Funeral services were held at St. Hugo of the Hills Church Monday morning for Mrs. Katherine Atkinson, mother of Frank W. Atkinson, Detroit attorney, of River-ton road, Bloomfield Hills. Burial was in Mt. Olivet.

Mrs. Atkinson died Monday after a week's illness in Sarnia, Ont., where she had been making her home for the winter. She was 88 years old.

She had spent three winters with her son in Bloomfield Hills, but at other times had made her home in Detroit, Sarnia, and Kerch, Ont., her birthplace. She had resided for 65 years in Detroit, where she was a leader in social circles up to the time of the death of her husband, William F. Atkinson, in 1907.

time it became delinquent until the total penalty amounted to 4 percent of the original tax.

"The reason for advocating sharp penalties at the beginning of delinquency when the tax lien is largest should be self-evident," Mr. Noonan said in describing the plan. "When the lien has been considerably reduced, as when the first four or five installments have been paid, the fact of the lien will probably be sufficient inducement to pay."
