KALAMAZOO, Mich., Mar. 24.—Donald Hanna, Birmingham, and James Den Herder, Grand Haven, have been elected co-captains of the Western State Teachers College basketball team for 1932-33, it was announced this week.

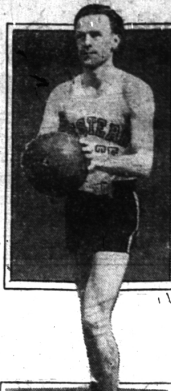
During his prep school days, Hanna, who is the son of Mrs. John Hanna, 484 Forest street, Birmingham, was one of the speediest court men that ever represented Ann Arbor High School.

After attending the University of Michigan for a year, he transferred to Western State at Kalamazoo.

This past season was his first as a member of the varsity team, and in spite of the fact that he was the smallest member of the mid-west Hilltop quintet with only 5 feet 7 inches of height, he was the high point scorer of the team and set a new all time scoring record with 180 points.

Boxer, Wrestler, Fencer Slated For Carnival April 1

Wrestling, boxing, fencing and demonstrations in jiu-jitsu and gymnastics, all by trained amateurs from Detroit and other centers, are included in the program for the athletic vaudeville to be given in the Baldwin High School gymnasium Friday, April 3, under the auspices of the Birmingham Boy Scout District Committee, members of the committee announced yesterday.

Sergeant S. W. Snowdon of the Detroit police department will give a demonstration in practical jiu-jitsu as used in police work, and two wrestling teams, one from Cranbrook School and the other from Detroit City College, will stage an exhibition match.

Broadword and saber demonstrations will be given by two fencing teams from the Cadillac Athletic Club of Detroit. These teams are slated to compete this spring in the state fencing championships.

The boxing headliner will be Dave Karp, the "battling newsboy" from Christ Church, Detroit, who has been a contender for the state amateur championship in his division for the past three years. Three other boxers are also on the program.

A specially selected gymnastic team from the Detroit Y. M. C. A. will give an exhibition on the parallel bars and in tumbling and springboard work.

One other novelty feature, not yet announced by the committee, is also scheduled. Leigh Lynch, Sr., 1240 Dorchester road, will be the master of ceremonies.
