## New Tapestry At Christ Church Cranbrook Completes Pair, Among World's Largest

Scores of visitors have been attracted to Christ Church Cranbrook during the past week to examine a new tapestry hung in the narthex of the church Thursday, and to be one of the largest modern tapestries in the world.

Portraying "The New Dispensation" in a symbolic history of the life of Christ, the tapestry complements and completes the story told by a similar fabric which has been in the possession of the church for about a year.

The latter is entitled "The Old Dispensation," and depicts a series of events which ends with Christ's Crucifixion. Generally speaking, the new tapestry characterizes the law of the New Testament, while the old tapestry symbolizes the law of the Old Testament.

Both fabrics were designed by J. H. Dearie and woven in the Morris Merton mills of London, England. They are unique among all tapestries in existence for their subject matter.

Each is about 12 feet wide and 20 feet long. Four men were needed to hang them in their present positions in the narthex at either side of the main entrance to the church, where special lighting arrangements have been provided to make their display more effective.

## WINS JUNIOR FENCING TITLE

### Birmingham Girl Is Runner-Up For State Senior Championship

Miss Katherine McCutcheon of Birmingham, a junior at Michigan State College, won the junior women's fencing championship of Michigan and was runner-up for the senior women's title in the annual tournaments at the Detroit Turnverein Saturday night.

Miss McCutcheon, who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. B. McCutcheon, 916 Harmon street, was defeated, 7 to 6, by Mrs. Joana Savich de Tuscan, the defending champion, in a thrilling final match for the senior title.

She entered the match when already spent from the effects of her work in winning the junior championship in a fight-off with Elsie Janda, another Michigan State student, a few minutes before.

It was the first time she had competed in the senior matches, being qualified only by her victory in the junior division.

Miss McCutcheon won the state novice title at the Turnverein last year. A graduate from Baldwin High School in 1929, she has been practicing with the foils only since her entrance in college.
