Seeks Return Of Happiness By Working In Dress Shop

Rose Allen Spurns Stage Offers Resulting From Brother's Murder Trial

PHILADELPHIA—Rose Allen is thankful for her father's friends. During the harrowing weeks when her brother, Edward H. B. Allen sat in the Montgomery county jail awaiting trial for the murder of his sister's sweetheart, Francis A. Donaldson, III, Rose was befriended by an old acquaintance of her mother's, Mrs. Henry W. Pierce of Haverford.

And now that her brother has been acquitted of the murder charge, another friend of her mother's has stepped forward to take Rose Allen under her wing by engaging her to work in her dress shop in this city.

Rose Has Changed

It is not the pale and drawn 18-year-old debutante who sat smiling on the witness stand parrying the questions of lawyers that one sees in the small West Philadelphia shop these days. It is a rather pretty, slim, energetic young woman who busies herself finding a sport dress or a sport hat that will suit the interested customer.

For Rose Allen, whose life the past year has been crammed with tragedy, has decided to attack her new job seriously. Because of her youth and good looks and publicity, this debutante was offered unsalaried contracts by theatrical managers who desired to put her name in lights and draw the curious. But Rose refused every offer and chose to give her services to her mother, who had been visited by her friend, and when the ordeal was ended, Rose came to her and suggested that she work in the shop, selling gowns and frocks to girls of her own age and set.

Seeks Happiness Again

"I felt that I wanted to work and earn my own living," Rose explains. "The offers of theatrical managers did not tempt me one bit. I believe that if I should devote myself to some definite occupation, such as working in a

store, I would be able to regain happiness. I haven't been here much more than a week, and I am just getting accustomed to the work, but I feel that I will like it."

Miss Allen's employer thinks highly of Rose's future in business. "Rose is certain to succeed," she observes. "She has a great deal of sense and she exhibits a genuine flair for the work. So far she has not done much selling, but has been helping me do the little things in the back of the shop. After she has become fully

acquainted with the business in all its aspects of buying and selling, I am sure she will be able to do more important things."

The store is not in the business section of the city, but is a small shop in the residential section and is patronized principally by young girls desiring sport and evening clothes.
