## From A WOMAN'S ANGLE

Remember war times when the capacious knitting bag was always among the present? Whether one attended a large party or dropped in to her next door neighbor, she was pretty sure to take her knitting, and was equally sure of finding others enjoying the same task.

Because women did enjoy knitting then, it is to be expected that they will continue to do so. Of course, there was the patriotic motive which added interest and touch of glamour.

It is to be able to add to the comfort of the boys in the A. E. F. and it could be done so easily and socially. Dextero clicks the needles while one chatted, and presto—a sweater emerged from a ball of yarn.

But when the war ended, women, deprived of the military charges, listlessly turned from knitting back to bridge.

Another patriotic duty is confronting women today. There is another soldier in need. He is fighting the battle of the unemployed against poverty and despair. His family, for which he is unable to provide, must also be considered.

"Women helped win the World War by knitting," reasoned the girls at Wellesley College recently. "Why can't women fight the depression with the same weapon, the knitting needle?"

And so knitting sweaters has become part of the drive for unemployment relief conducted by Wellesley students.

At the last check made, the girls had converted 325 pounds of knitting wool into 600 sweaters. In addition, they had found time to make 100 dresses out of 189 yards of dress material.

All the finished articles were turned over to the unemployed in neighboring communities. The systematic knitting campaign accomplished a dual purpose. Not only was clothing furnished to those in need, but the increased demand for knitting wool resulted in big extra work to the mills, which also brought some relief to the unemployment situation.

If women throughout the country followed the example of these college girls in getting out their war-time knitting needles, they would be doing a service for humanity as well as for their community.

If the comparatively small group of girls at Wellesley can turn out 600 sweaters in a short time, it's a matter of simple arithmetic to figure out what the women of the nation could produce if they put their shoulder to the wheel.

And why not? What is to prevent them from doing it? If it is a question of raising money to buy yarn, there is always the benefit bridge to rely upon.

Here, at least, is one practical manner of justifying bridge. Let those who have spent so much valuable time perfecting their game, use it to advantage by patronizing benefits for a worthy cause.

There are innumerable groups who could take up knitting—the small club meeting weekly for luncheon, the sewing group might alternate knitting and sewing at its meetings; the church group, making layettes, can realize the importance of small knitted garments in outfits for the new baby.

And those individuals who have a pair of idle hands might employ them profitably in this way, too.
