MOTORIST BLAMED IN DEATH CRASH
Prosecutor Delays Asking Warrant After Coroner's Jury Cites 'Negligence'

Clarence L. Smith, county prosecuting attorney, was still undecided yesterday whether he would ask that a warrant be issued for the arrest of R. J. DePuis of Flint, who was blamed by a coroner's jury Saturday for the death of Oliver M. Green, Pontiac Negro attorney, in an automobile collision on Woodward avenue near Lone Pine road on the night of March 19.

Prosecutor Smith announced after the jury had returned its verdict, charging DePuis with negligence, that a warrant would probably be issued, but that he desired first check on traffic conditions on Woodward avenue at the time of the accident.

Green was killed when an automobile in which he was riding, driven by Albert McCaskill, Negro, also of Pontiac, stopped suddenly and Green got out to inspect the gas tank. DePuis' car struck him from the rear, inflicting injuries from which he died two hours later in St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital.

Irena Banks and Elmer Kephart of the Bloomfield Hills police department were called as witnesses at the coroner's inquest.
