## TANK, COURT AWARDS MADE

### Eight Swimmers, 11 Cagers Win Letters At Baldwin High

Eight swimming and 11 basketball awards for the 1932 season were agreed upon by the Baldwin High School Athletic Board of Control last week for those who participated in the sports but did not earn their letters, certificates or medals in the customary manner.

The swimmers honored were Captain John Botting, Captain-elect Jack Hogan, Manley Botting, Bill Lynch, Charles Miller, Alex MacDiarmid, Edgar Zimmer and Guy Howard.

Basketball letters were awarded to Captain Victor Canever, Derwood Harris, Roland Brown, Kenneth Hunt, Robert Bunyan, John Metke, Dick Forrester, Kenneth McBride, Fred Schwarze, Donald

McDonough and Manager Leo Ward. John Botting, swimming captain for the past season, established a brilliant record in the two years he was on the squad. From the beginning he established himself as a distance swimmer, and in his event, the 220-yard freestyle, he has been defeated only three times in dual competition. He has a third and a fourth place to his credit in Southeastern League meets and two seconds in state meets. Besides this, he acted as lead-off man for the freestyle relay team and was its second fastest member. He will return for the first semester next year, but will be graduated before the championship meets. His place will be taken next season by Jack Hogan, sprint star. Hogan is a two-letter man and the fastest member of the squad in both the 100-yard freestyle and 50-yard dash events. He was seriously handicapped by illness and lack of practice, but in spite of this he has for two years taken second place in the century at the state meet.

Captain Canever, of the cage squad, has frequently been praised for his ability to handle the ball and for the clean, fast game he plays. He rarely led the scoring column, but the opponent he played against never did. Canever also has shown skill in cross-country and track. He will return for the first semester next year.

### TOWNSHIP MAY BUY FIRE EXTINGUISHERS

Permission to buy or reject two chemical fire extinguishers to be added to Baldwin Township's fire fighting equipment was given Supervisor Perry A. Vaughan by the Township Board at its meeting Monday afternoon.

Purchase of the extinguishers was recommended by John E. Wilson, township highway commissioner and chief of the fire department, who suggested that two dry gas units under 550 pounds pressure, costing \$80 each, be secured this year, and two more similar extinguishers next year.

(Continued from Page 1, Part 2) \$5,000,000 soldier bonus bonds due in July, he recommends that \$1,000,000 be paid and that the state plan to refund the remaining balance for the next four years, taking \$1,000,000 out of the annual tax levy each year to pay the balance.

State Government Expenses He recommends that legislation, where needed, be passed to permit the reduction of all personal service expenses of the state 15 percent beginning July 1. He would cut 15 percent from the salaries of all state officials and employees which are subject to legislative control. He proposes a reduction in the totals of all supplies, material and contractual service expenses as set up in the budget.

For the University of Michigan and Michigan State College he recommends a 15 percent cut beginning with the fiscal year July from the amount fixed in the mix act of 1931.

There is also recommended a cancellation of all appropriations for capital outlay and a 15 percent reduction in the amount appropriated for state services.

He recommends increased control over the state payrolls by the creation of a Personnel Commission, consisting of members of the House and Senate and three appointed by the Governor.

Local School Budgets He recommends that local school budgets throughout the state be cut at least 15 percent and that the Legislature submit to the voters the questions of a constitutional amendment which will give the Legislature authority to provide for an income tax to replace the property tax that is now used to support the school system of the state.

Highway Taxation The Legislature is asked to enact a law which will permit the return of the entire weight tax collected by the state to the various counties, a plan frequently advocated by previous Legislatures. The Legislature is also requested to retain control to a very large extent of the manner in which these funds shall be expended by the counties, cities and villages.

It is under this section of his message that the Legislature will give consideration to the relief of Covert road assessment districts, the reduction of county mill tax levied upon property, the maintenance of county highways, the refunding of outstanding bonds and numerous other highway and bridge problems.

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## Bloomfield Hills P. T. A. Hears Lynd

### Y. M. C. A. Secretary Tells Of Opportunities Offered Youth in Summer Camps

Opportunities for physical, moral and mental growth as presented to young boys and girls in summer camps were described for members of the Parent-Teacher Association of Bloomfield Hills Elementary School in an address Thursday night by Robert D. Lynd, secretary of the Birmingham Y. M. C. A.

Illustrating his remarks on camp life with pictures taken last summer at the Oakland County Y. M. C. A. camp on Loon Lake, Mr. Lynd enumerated several different phases of summer education for youth, including playground work and vacation Bible schools as well as camps.

He included the opportunities for self-government; creative handicrafts in leather, metal, wood and other crafts; the study of nature, and the examples of right living by college leaders as the principal advantages of the young camp attendants.

In addition, he pointed out several camps furnished personal guidance in psychological adjustment for boys and girls who possess individual traits of temperament that make them different from others.

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
