

MISSION GROUP TO MEET HERE

400 Women Expected For 2-Day Session Of Detroit Presbytery

Sessions will be held both morning and afternoon during the two days, with a special program Tuesday night featuring a children's hour missionary play directed by Mrs. Earl G. Potter of Birmingham.

TOOLE TOPS ALL-STARS

Detroit Court Champs Overcome 'Y' League's Best, 42-3

The caliber of basketball played in the Birmingham Y.M.C.A. basketball league took a decided step upward Tuesday night when the All-Stars quintet, composed of selected "Y" league players, lost a torrid struggle, 42 to 34, to the Dr. Toole team, biennial champions of the Detroit Federation and Recreation League, and the second All-Star squad walloped May and Malone of Roy, the newly crowned Oakland County champs, 31 to 25. Both tilts were played before a capacity crowd at a special post-season attraction in the Baldwin High gymnasium.

The local All-Stars took a manager lead at the outset of their tilt with the Toole Dentists, and succeeded in holding the metropolitan team on even terms until midway in the third period. Here, Ed Gussin, captain of the All-Stars, was banished from the contest upon the commitment of his fourth foul. Roy took a lead from that point onward the play was slightly in Toole's favor.

Ran Natta, flashy Birmingham guard, opened the scoring for the evening when he tossed in a nice one-handed shot from the vicinity of the free-throw line. Hoy, local pivot man, stepped into the scoring column a few seconds later with the free-throw line. Hoy and Birmingham took a 4 to 2 advantage. This was short-lived, however, and the quarter ended with the tally even, 10 to 10.

It was apparent as the second period neared its close that the Birmingham team was weakening a trifle. With Gussin, Toole guard, leading the way, the Detroit players succeeded in securing a two-point lead as the half ended. Gussin tossed in five buckets during the first two periods, Birmingham's visiting ace, Milanov, a member of Olivet College's championship team, entered the game shortly before the finish of the initial half and held Gussin to three counters in the final two periods, while he himself was scoring six, to make his total for the evening eight.

With the Detroit quintet holding a slight advantage as the teams resumed play in the third period, Birmingham made a gallant effort to gain the lead. Hoy scored eight points in the last half, making most of his counters on difficult follow-in shots. He was the high-scoring man for the evening with 14 counters.

The Toole players unleashed their vaulted offensive late in the third quarter and quickened their pace as the local quintet rapidly tired. The dentists had established a comfortable 32 to 24 edge at the terminus of the third period, mainly by the efforts of Waddell, who registered three field goals in this session.

Late Rally Led by Hoy and Milanov, the local All-Stars began a belated rally midway through the session and succeeded in bringing the score within four points of a tie. Here, however, Davis' superior team play clinched the decision and the Federation champs coasted in the last few minutes of play to a well-earned victory.

The result of the preliminary tilt was somewhat of a surprise. The local team led at every interval in the game. It must be acknowledged, however, in all fairness to May and Malone, that two of the outstanding players on their team, namely, Grace and O'Toole, were playing on the Birmingham All-Star five. This loss considerably weakened the county title-holders' play.

Shave led the Birmingham scorers in the preliminary, gathering 10 points, but the high man for the game was Brande, forward on the Royal Oak team, who scored 12 marks. Wedge, Ladd and Moore played strong games for the locals, while Hartwick, prior to his banishment from the struggle with four personals against him, was a tower of strength for May and Malone.
