## Cranbrook Tracksters Score Five New School Records To Trim Albion Fresh

Piling up five new school records and tying another, the track and field men of the Cranbrook School scored a resounding victory over the Albion College freshman thimble-ds at Cranbrook Saturday, 94.54 to 27.54.

The Blue and Gray athletes exceeded their goals in every branch of the sport and scored singles in the 100-yard dash, mile and half-mile runs, pole vault and high jump.

Albion took only one first place in the high hurdles—although Andrew of Cranbrook clipped 1.2 seconds off his school's previous record to finish second in this event with a time of 14 seconds flat.

Harfist tied the former record of 10:2 in the century, and broke his own mark of 2:3 seconds in the low hurdles by clearing over the barriers in 2:8.

Benedict and Berry both improved on their previous record performances in the shot and high jump, respectively, while Harfist and Rauch are trying for victory in the broad jump with leaps of 20 feet 7 inches each, broke Rauchs' former mark of 19 feet 11 1/2 inches.
