

HUGE BALLOT FACES VOTERS

10 Parties, Eight State Questions Make Ticket Largest in History

LANSING, Nov. 3.—Voters on Nov. 8 will receive the largest ballot in the history of the state. So large is the ballot that two sheets of paper, both nearly the size of a newspaper page, will be handed each voter who enters the voting booth.

The general election will contain the names of the candidates of the 10 parties which have entered in the state campaign. These parties are the Republican, Democratic, Socialist, Prohibition, American, Socialist Labor, Communist, Proletarian, Liberty and Farmer-Labor. They will appear on the ballot in the order named.

This order is determined by the secretary of state first place being given to the party, by law, whose candidate for secretary of state received the largest vote at the last election. If the party's candidate for that office received the vote at the last election, then the Department of State in given authority to designate the place where the party will appear on the ballot.

Only the Republican and Democratic parties have complete tickets. The American party has no candidates for any office except in Wayne County. Two parties, the American and Proletarian, have not named candidates for president or vice-president. The Centralia, Proletarian, Liberty and American parties are new to Michigan. These names never figured in Michigan's history.

The eight governmental questions and referendums will require a ballot 45 inches in length. In order to make the huge sheet easier to handle, many counties have printed the referendum ballots in two columns. This is the first time in Michigan's history that this has been done.

RECTOR DEFENDS CAPITALIST PLAN

Aulenbach Urges Exchanges to Persevere Toward Established Objectives

Whether Hoover or Roosevelt is elected won't make the difference of a snap of the fingers, in comparison with the individual efforts of the people of the nation in restoring the capitalist system to its normal functions, according to Rev. W. Hamilton Aulenbach, assistant rector of Christ Church, Granbrook.

Mr. Aulenbach, in an address before the Birmingham Exchange Club at its meeting in the Community House Tuesday noon, expressed confidence in capitalism and urged his listeners to carry on determinedly towards their present established objectives, and not be upset by the illusory promises of new goals and ideas. "You men should have learned by experience," he said, "that if you keep a stiff upper lip long enough, you'll find yourself doing the very thing you most wanted to do."

He held up the Englishman, John Bunyan, as an example of one who "dared to stick towards one objective in life, and dispensed the American tendency of worshipping the dollar above the more substantial joys of life."

"The freedom of life comes not when you can go out and buy a \$15 silk shirt or a \$15 car—or a half dozen of them," he declared.

"The freedom of life comes when you have to go out and struggle a little for an existence."

"The capitalist system," he continued, "is not perfect, by any means. There are adjustments to be made. But there doesn't seem to be any system devised by mankind which is any better, or which will eliminate the poor. Even Jesus said that the poor will always be with us."

"I think those people who are going to enter a protest vote for Norman Thomas are all upset, and that they will be actually throwing their vote away. When you're hard-pressed you don't change your road. You straighten it out and smooth it off a bit, but you don't abandon it altogether."

He mentioned the fact that "good people are weak," and that "it takes the wicked person to be strong." For that reason, he maintained, "politics will always be as full of graft and corruption as they ever were."

"It is up to you men whether America succeeds or fails," he added. "Whether Hoover or Roosevelt is elected won't make that much difference, and you know it."

Englishmen Address Managers' Conclave

Parry Impressed With Foreigners Views At Annual Convention

A distinct English tone featured the annual convention of the International City Managers' Association held in Cincinnati, O., last week, according to William Manager James W. Parry, who attended.

Three of the principal speakers, he said, were Englishmen with municipal experience in their native country, all of whom offered a contrast on the administration of city government in England with that of the United States.

"The convention was an outstanding success in every way," Mr. Parry said. "It gave attention to several municipal problems, all of nationwide and worldwide scope, but which at the time were applicable to local conditions."

The possibility of cities obtaining relief loans from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation was one of the chief considerations of the convention, which was attended by about 125 managers, Mr. Parry said.
