

**BUCK HEARS 41 CASES IN MONTH**

314 Persons Arraigned Under Local Ordinances, Fines, Costs Total \$2688

Judge Floyd S. Buck heard 41 criminal cases in September and collected \$2688.55 in fines, costs and fees, his monthly report reveals.

Only one of the cases were arraigned under Birmingham Village ordinances. These included one case of drunk driving, one of reckless driving and four of speeding. Fines amounted to \$1087 and costs to \$27.

Eighteen defendants were arraigned in Judge Buck's court under Bloomfield Hills ordinances. Of these seven were charged with trespassing, three with speeding, one with reckless driving, six with disorderly conduct, and one with drunk driving. Two of the defendants were given jail terms and the others paid \$313 in fines and costs.

Of 17 persons charged with violating state statutes, one was dismissed, one was placed on probation, one was given jail terms and fines, one was bound over to Circuit Court, and the others were fined. Fines and costs amounted to \$66, and fees to \$77.55.

The cases included one of malicious destruction of property, three of disorderly conduct, six of violating traffic signals, one of drunk driving, one of assault and battery, one of embezzlement, two of trafficking in registered milk bottles, one of driving a trailer without a license, and one of assault with intent to do great bodily harm.
