## ENROLLMENT GAIN MADE IN SCHOOLS

**September Registration Shows Increase Of 32 Students Over That Of 1931**

The total number of students registered in the Birmingham schools during September exceeded that of the corresponding month a year ago by 32 students, according to complete enrollment figures for the first two weeks of school submitted to the Board of Education last Thursday night by Superintendent Charles W. Crandall.

The registration for September 1932 was 2,549, as compared with 2,517 in September, 1931. The membership, or average attendance, for the period showed a still greater increase this fall over last year, rising from 2,490 in 1931 to 2,549 in 1932.

The enrollment was divided by schools as follows:

Baldwin High, 443; Baldwin Junior High, 194; Adams Junior High, 196; Barram Junior High, 226; Pierce Grade School, 252; Quanton Grade School, 333; Barram Grade School, 354; Adams Grade School, 551.

Tuition students enrolled during September totaled 80, from which \$11,790 in tuition fees will be derived, the report shows. The tuition students included 16 enrolled in the kindergarten through the sixth grades, five in the seventh and eighth grades, and 59 in the four highest grades.

**SCHOOL LOAN TO PAY INTEREST CONCEIVED**

The Board of Education last Thursday night discussed the possibility of borrowing \$22,000 against anticipated 1932 taxes with which to meet past due interest payments on bonds. Louis H. Schimmel of the Municipal Advisory Council outlined the provisions on which the loan might be made, and indicated that definite willingness or unwillingness to lend the money would probably be forthcoming from a Detroit bank today.

## Detroit Jailed For Month On '31 Speeding Charge

Pelix Wajick, 4445 30th street, Detroit, is serving a 30-day term in the Oakland County Jail for a misdemeanor committed in Birmingham more than a year ago.

Wajick was arrested for speeding on Woodward avenue on July 12, 1931. He failed to appear to answer the charge when summoned to court, and a warrant was issued on Aug. 24, 1931. Repeated attempts to serve the warrant in Detroit were unsuccessful when Wajick convinced the officers he was not the man they wanted.

Wajick's argumentative powers were below par when officers appeared last Monday. However, he brought him back to face Judge Floyd S. Buck. The judge imposed a fine and costs of \$35, which Wajick was unable to pay. Instead, he was committed to jail for 30 days.

Saturday, Harold J. Howe of Ann Arbor was fined \$35 for speeding after being picked up on a warrant when he failed to appear to answer charges growing out of his arrest here Sept. 5.

## BOARD TO ACT ON POOR PLAN

**Talk Of Loan From R. F. C. Delays Relief Action**

The Oakland County Board of Supervisors is expected to reach a final decision today as to whether to accept the administration of poor relief shall revert to the individual townships and cities after Jan. 1, or be retained under the present centralized system.

Scheduled to put the question to a vote Monday the board deferred action again when Supervisor Alfred Gale broached the possibility of securing a loan from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation which would make it unnecessary to levy taxes for poor relief this winter.

He said he had learned from unofficial sources that the county might borrow sufficient funds to be repaid by deductions from the state's federal road allowance. A committee composed of Supervisors C. N. Smith, Arthur Lakin and W. C. Hudson, Civil Council George A. Cram, and members of the Board of Commissioners and Board of Auditors was appointed to investigate the possibility of such a loan.

The supervisors also deferred action on the latest suggestion for refunding Covert road bonds. The suggestion entails refunding the bonds in the full amount of the principal, but with the interest rate lowered to 8 percent.

Cram asked that action on the proposal be deferred until an opinion from the attorney general can be secured.
