

Soccer Stars Stage Hard Fought Game at Cranbrook

CLEVELANDERS BEAT CRANES

Cranbrook Soccer Squad
Bows In Overtime
Tussle, 3 to 2

The Cranbrook soccer team, for the first time in seven years, School, came out into overtime periods at Cranbrook Saturday before Cleveland finally won, 3 to 2, in the second appearance of the Cranbrook team.

**Blue and Gray Sticks To Straight Football
To Trounce Visitors in Loose Game**

The Cranbrook football varsity team, under the leadership of Coach Harry C. Gilmore, won its first game of the season Saturday afternoon, 13 to 0, over Detroit University School, at Cranbrook. Cranbrook easily outscored D. U. S. in the first period, but lost most opportunity to amass an even greater score.

Cranbrook's attack moved little greater part of the tackle and center punts, whereas a few short passes might have doubled Cranbrook's score.

The game was easily stopped by U. S. about midway of the first half, when the Blue and Gray team lost control of the ball. After a few plays, however, the visitors' offense had incomplete passes from the line of scrimmage.

For the remainder of the game D. U. S. threw itself headlong into a passing attack. Head attempts to stop the Blue and Gray team, but lacked skill and Cranbrook's defense was equal to it. Finally, after a series of penalties, D. U. S. scored.
