WARN DRIVERS TO REGISTER

Police Point To Nov. 1 As Deadline Under 1931 Statute

Birmingham and Bloomfield police departments both warned yesterday that Tuesday, Nov. 1, is the last date for re-registration of motorists under the 1931 statute.

The Tuesday deadline affects the owners of all operator's licenses issued between December 31, 1927 and May 1, 1931. Under the present law, drivers must acquire to obtain a new license every three years. Prior to that time, once a license was issued, it was good until the driver lost it.

The present statute became effective Jan. 1, 1931. Under its provisions all licenses issued prior to Jan. 1, 1925, expired Nov. 1, 1931; those issued prior to Jan. 1, 1928, are to expire Dec. 31, 1932, expire May 1, 1932 and all licenses issued subsequent to Dec. 31, 1927, expire Nov. 1, 1933.

Although it is believed practically all drivers in this section have already complied with the new law, those who have not, even in both Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills have still failed to secure their new licenses.

Applications for re-registration may be made at police stations or at the state office in Birmingham or Bloomfield Hills. The fee is \$1.

Police also repeated the warning that they must be notified of all changes of a driver's address or the latter will be subject to arrest.


McGrath's car was totally wrecked, while the others were less badly damaged.

CROWDS HEAR SCIENCE TALK

Near-Capacity Audience Gathers For Free Lecture By Bostonian

A near-capacity audience assembled in the First Church of Christ, Scientist, here Monday evening to hear a free Christian Lecture given by Rev. Dr. Price C. Tomlinson, S. S. B., member of the Board of Trustees of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, Boston.

Mr. Tomlinson spoke in part as follows:

From the beginning of its first division in 1869, the Baker-Eddy Christian Science has offered advantages that have been widely recognized. The number is growing that accept these benefits.

Scores "False Education"

What is it that hinders some from accepting such ideals? What is it that causes them to doubt the validity of these teachings? False education has taught mortals to look to the five corporeal senses for reliable means of knowledge.

The world has need of a verity of the corporeal senses, but the material eye sees not been thought of as a means of creating, but that is an error, not that which seems to be but is not.

God has a single one of the corporeal senses, the entire realm of spiritual divine intelligence. All our troubles occur in the material sense, and temporal. Accumulation of material sense testimony and therefore an accumulation of material is futile to guarantee security and happiness in this world.

Right today when he becomes of confidence in the material regime of falsehood? Both fear and pain are natural, but fear and pain are not evil. But spiritual, spiritual, real and good, are cumulative, and however high he shall go, even so far as he discerns the line of beauty, the line of corporeal sense and reality, between matter and spirit, between mortal ideas, more understanding which is the substance of spirit.

Again, to continue on this point of spiritual sense, no organic structure was made for the material sense. Did not the eye see all myconous mortal sight, though his eye is perfect? Is there any vision where there is no mind, no intelligence? Did not the ear catch a gnat's吟吟 of this when he said: "He that planted the ear, shall not hear?" He sees! And when he says, "I am wise! Mind! Eye! Mind! Eye!" Is this Mind visual organs? Does it not see without organic structures? The perfect understanding of the material (Science and Health, p. 487) enabled Jesus to heal blindness.

Found Home in Science

Beginning of the Christian Science, although very unorganized clergyman and seeking God, I seemed unable to feel His nearness, unable to see His promise fulfilled, that "He will heal all thy diseases." The Bible accounts of God's helpful dealings with prophet and prophet seemed to me to be nothing. But after getting an understanding of Christian Science, whenever I chanted a long, hard day's work and was weary, I would take time to think of Him, to realize infinite love and His omnipotent power. Then the weariness would fade away, the confusion vanish and stand and alertness take their place.

This made the God of the Bible seem real, not an influence, for my need was great. Who knows and proves that he has an all-powerful, almighty, and ever-present power always available, does not the love of God, which give him confidence to meet every problem and take away all doubts?

Christian Science includes in its understanding of the Bible seven synonymous words: Spirit, Soul, Principle, Life, Truth, Love, and Innocence. These words and are interchangeable. But like the facets of a flawless diamond they have variegated facets for our understanding. They speak to our perception, as for example, the primitive, unchanging essence of good:
