Village Clerk Corrects Misimpression Reading Petition Of New Body

Pulse impressions of the status of the nine Charter Commissioners to be elected Tuesday in the event that the City government function passes the vote have been created in the minds of many Birmingham residents says Miss Irene Hanley, Village Clerk.

Miss Hanley announced that the names of the nine Charter Commissioners to be elected Tuesday in the event that Birmingham becomes a city will be chosen from the 14 candidates on the ballot will be solely to frame a charter in the event that Birmingham becomes a city at the special election.

"These nine men would have absolutely no connection with the administration after Birmingham became a city," Miss Hanley says. "No question of electing them to government offices, but they will be put before the voters, except that they will be given the right to choose the men who will frame the new charter."

Elleray, Adams avenue; insurance agent and former Village President; Lawrence H. Gilbert, Brown street; Village Commissioner and officer of the Detroit Pipe and Sulphite company; Ernest W. Osborne, Pine street; secretary of Ford Motor company; Village Commissioner; Frank Parkard, Harmon avenue; contractor; and Village Commissioner; Charles J. Shain, Pierce street, drug store proprietor and former Village President; Harry S. Smart, Worth street; city engineer of Bloomfield Hills; former Birmingham Village Manager; James Taylor, Madison avenue; contractor; Clarence Vliet, Sr., Brown street, former superintendent of schools; and Lee A. White, Brookside Drive, member of Detroit News executive editorial staff.

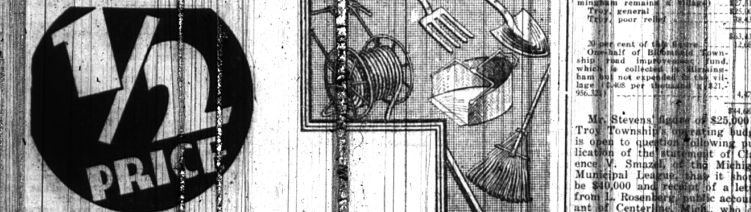
