## Marriage Of Last May Is Announced By Bride's Mother

An opportunity for further study of the various aspects of World Peace will be offered Birmingham this year in the form of international discussions conducted by Mrs. Charles J. Shain at the Community House.

Mrs. Shain, who returned last week from the Institute of World Politics at Williamstown, Mass., has announced that her class will begin the first Tuesday in October two weeks earlier than the customary opening of the season for this. Mrs. Shain explained, will be to include in the course the "Moral and Political Aspects of Peace," as outlined by Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt and the Conference on the Cause and Cure of War of which she is Chairperson. The first three classes will be devoted to this subject.

"While at the Institute Mrs. Catt discussed the matter with me and asked me to carry the message of the Marston Round Table to Michigan women," Mrs. Shain said. "For that reason the class here will open at an earlier date to include the discussion. As always, the class will be open to all Birmingham women interested in world peace and international affairs. It will meet at the usual hour, 10 o'clock in the morning at the Community House."

Two interesting round tables at the Institute of Politics attended by Mrs. Shain were "The Disintegration of the Modern World Order," led by Prof. Arnold Toynbee, Dean of the Royal Institute of International Relations in London, England; and that on "The American Foreign Policy" led by Prof. John H. Williams of Harvard University, economist for the American Bankers Association.

Other lectures and discussions at the Institute this year centered chiefly around the economic aspect of world peace. Mrs. Shain said. "Among other notable speakers during courses were Raymond Hoagland, director of the Foreign Policy Association who discussed "Limitation of Armament"; James P. Shotwell, director of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace; Prof. Bernhard Schmidt of the University of Chicago, whose subject was "Conditions in Central Europe"; and George E. Sokolsky, distinguished international journalist and author. Mr. Far Eastern affairs, who will come to Detroit to address an audience this fall at the University of Michigan women attending the Institute. The latter was Miss Carrie Heaton, secretary of the League of Nations' office in Grand Rapids.

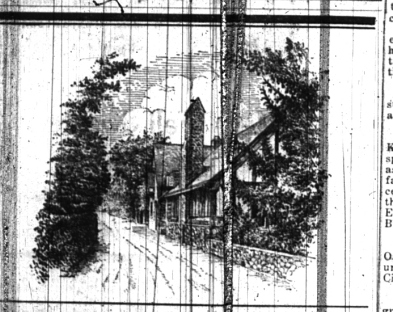
