

**IMMUNIZING PLAN CALLED SUCCESS**

Health Department Conducts Saturday Clinics for Indigent Whites Interest Shown

The worth of the recently instituted immunization clinics sponsored by the Village Health Department is proving itself in the opinion of Health Department authorities, as expressed after a two-week trial. Had there been clouds and gloomy sky, birds and flowers, streams and hills will cease to exist.

Considerable attention has been attracted to the clinics, which are held Saturday mornings from 9:00 to 11:30 o'clock. While the attendance has not been large, it equals expectations, officials say, but the number of inquiries made shows a village-wide interest in the project.

The object of the clinic is to provide immunization from disease for indigent who are unable to give their family physicians. By going to the office of the Health Department at the stated hours also Saturday morning, they may secure immunization from diphtheria by inoculation with tetanus and from smallpox by vaccination.
