Late summer bloomers, vegetable and luscious fruits will be for sale at the Flower, Fruit and Vegetable Show, sponsored by the Bloomfield Hills and District Horticultural Society at the Community House, Saturday.

Instead of cash prizes as in former years, ribbons will be awarded for first and second honors. All exhibits must be outdoor grown and all must be properly named. The rules of the show further require that all exhibits must be in position by Saturday noon.

Those judging the show will be: L. Unger, A. A. Shroyer, H. Mathers and J. Rogerson. Classes open to non-members include exhibits of zinnias, dahlias, gladioli, aster, roses, and vases of annuals and perennials. Also dishes of apples, pears, green beans, beets, carrots, cucumbers and tomatoes.

At the close of the show, the exhibits of fruit and vegetables will be donated to the welfare department of the Community House.

Regular classes for members include collections of cut flowers, vases of perennials, vases of annuals, roses (outdoor grown), dahlias, gladioli, fruit and vegetables.

Birmingham Committee To Announce Plans For First Symphony Festival

To make plans for the first Symphony Festival for Detroit and the Metropolitan Area, to take place in Detroit the week of Sept. 26.

During the festival, a series of five concerts will be presented at the Orchestra Hall, each of which will be free to the public, under the sponsorship of various Detroit organizations.

The concert on Monday evening, Sept. 26, will be held under auspices of the American Legion, and will feature, in addition to orchestral music by the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, songs by the Faust Foot Chorus, famous among Legion choruses.

At this concert, a new march written for Modern Shrine by Victor Kolar, associate director of the orchestra, will be presented and dedicated. The Student Loan Fund Association of Birmingham is an organization founded in 1919 for the purpose of "procuring, receiving and administering funds of money or other capital assets in order to render financial assistance in pursuit of further education to such students as are deemed deserving and worthy by the corporation."

The fund was established by a gift of \$100 from the graduating class of Baldwin High School of 1919. Other organizations added to this amount from time to time increasing the fund until it had reached the sum of \$8,857.07 by August, 1930.

Since that time, the demands have been greater owing to the financial depression and the fact that funds were made unavailable due to the closing of the First State Savings Bank a year ago.

The Association plans to continue the work of assisting students, and to that end, the officers have planned the bridge benefit to aid in meeting four new applications this year.
