Youth Guilty Of Assault, Battery

But Complainant Is Also Penalized As Result Of Neighborhood Feud

Defendant and complainant were both penalized by Judge Floyd S. Buck as the court heard the trial of an assault and battery case in his office Friday.
Collin Henry, 18 years old, 738 Smith street, the defendant, was put on probation for six months when convicted of charges brought by a neighbor, Roy Patterson, 638 Smith street. Patterson himself was placed under \$100 bond for six months to keep the peace.
Charges against Henry grew out of a neighborhood quarrel which began when Patterson shot at Henry's cat with an air rifle. Henry climbed over a fence and attacked Patterson, the testimony revealed.
The testimony of one 17-year-old witness convinced the court that the quarrel was of a fairly serious nature.
'You say that after the defendant climbed over the fence, he struck the complainant and that the complainant's wife hit him with a club?' asked the attorney.
'Yes,' replied the witness.
'What happened then?'
'When there was fighting, the witness answered.

'We have had some conversations with the bankers since the communication was received, but got no real encouragement,' Mr. Palmer said yesterday. 'It seems evident they will stand by the terms of the Advisory Council's letter.'
A plan for advance payment of taxes was discussed at the meeting last week as a possible means of solving the problem. Calling of a mass meeting of farmers and taxpayers to review the situation and perhaps devise a remedy was also considered.
