ADITORS ASK President's Day Observed Despite The President

Would Pare \$461,224 From County's 1932 Appropriations

The Ways and Means and Salaries Committee of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors has before it today a proposed budget for 1933 of \$2,253,900, only \$41,224 less than last year's budget and 20 percent below the appropriation for 1932.

The proposal, presented by the Board of Auditors Monday, includes an item of \$1,000,000 for relief which will not be needed if the supervisors decide to return the problem of welfare supervision to the individual cities and townships as proposed.

This question will be decided definitely at the current session of the board with a two-thirds majority needed to retain the present County Poor Commission system.

Pay Cuts Asked. The proposed budget recommends a payroll reduction of 30.4 percent, although even this is not so drastic as the recommendations previously made by the Salaries Committee of the Board of Supervisors, which last asked for the salaries of elective officials to be slashed from 10 to 50 percent.

Salary cuts recommended by the auditors include the following: sheriff from \$7,100 to \$4,500; combined salaries of sheriff's assistants from \$23,220 to \$22,500; prosecutor from \$7,000 to \$5,000; combined salaries of prosecutor's assistants from \$23,220 to \$22,500; probate judge from \$7,000 to \$5,000; register of deeds from \$5,000 to \$4,000; school commissioner from \$5,000 to \$4,000, and treasurer from \$5,000 to \$4,000.

Courts Appropriations. The recommended appropriation for upkeep of the Circuit Courts, although in the health department, the elimination of one of three physicians is recommended, together with salary cuts for the other two.

The Board of Supervisors now adjourns, will meet again Friday morning when it is expected to appoint a member to the Board of Trustees of the Oakland County Tuberculosis Sanatorium and one member to the Road Commission.
