**Forward Wall Prospects Have Speed and Experience, Lack Weight**  
 (This is the first of a series of feature articles on the Baldwin High School football squad as seen by Coach Miles W. Robinson. The featured possibilities will be discussed in next week's issue.)

 The area through veterans of the Baldwin High School football squad this year to furnish a complete forward defense of letters men, but if this line is used in tact it will be slightly lighter than the regular line of regular players. There would be, however, fewer, however, according to Coach Miles W. Robinson.  
 It will not be necessary to rely entirely on these experienced players to open holes and cut off opponents' plays at their own defense. The heavier candidates now competing for places on the team.  
 One of the most noticeable characteristics of the squad so far, Coach Robinson believes, is the celerity with which the members have accustomed themselves to the fundamentals. The team is rounding into shape much faster than last year, probably because of the number of experienced players in the squad.  
**Letters Signals Quickly**  
 So many players on the squad have had the experience of one season, that the new style of play instituted at the beginning of last year that no trouble has been encountered in teaching signals and other fundamentals, the coach declared.  
 The rather drastic amendments to the letter defense which Robinson takes effect this season will make little difference in the playing style of the team, Robinson believes. The prospects for the position of center looked rather dim at the beginning of the season, but this week, Dave is being readied into center and has made a fine showing to date. Lee Diers, who was second team center last year, is being readied for the position. So far, practice has uncovered two other possibilities, Cliff Smith, a junior, and Page Dinsel, a sophomore.  
**Guards Are Numerous**  
 For the guard berth, (Clay Bradford, a reserve backfield man of last season, and Jerry Anderson, who played various positions on the line, seem to be among the leaders at present. Both are lettermen. Anderson has a slight edge over Bradford, who is entering his third year of football, and Kenneth Jones, a senior. Bob Harris, brother of the quarterback, is being readied as a guard by giving himself known as a great deal of trouble in scrimmages.  
 It will be hard for the tackle this year to fill the shoes of Miller and McClelland, who held the tackle positions last year. Fred Cushing and Bud Laughlin, who substituted for the regular tackle a year ago and are now taking their turn with the first team in scrimmages, lack at least some of the aggressiveness which put Miller on Remington's all-state team and made McClelland's opponents fear him in every game.  
 A great deal of improvement is expected from both Cushing and Laughlin, however. The understudy for the tackle holds are Guy Howard, Randall Kidder and the Forester brothers, Dick and Warren. All have shown some ability and may be prominent members of the team before the season is over.  
 For ends, the two regulars of last year are both on the list. Bud Shepper and Harry Bresford played almost the entire season on the first team. With a year's experience behind them, both are expected to distinguish themselves during the season. Additional strength is available in Bill Moss, Fred Boynton and Bob Sabom, all of whom played in some games last year, and Charles Miller and Vic Canover.
