B.H.S. TO HAVE VETERAN LINE**Forward Wall Prospects Have Speed and Experience, Lack Weight**

(This is the first of a series of lines on the Baldwin High School football squad as seen by Coach Bruce W. Robinson. The buckfield possibilities will be discussed in next week's issue.)

There are enough veterans on the Baldwin High School football squad this year to furnish a complete forward defense if the team is to win, but if this is not so, it will be slightly lighter than the regular line of last year. This does not mean the endeavor to come up to the mark will be lessened.

It will not be necessary to rely entirely on those experienced players to open holes and cut off opportunities for the backs to score, as all heavier candidates now competing for places on the team.

One of the most noticeable characteristics of the squad so far has been the remarkable speed and agility with which the members have accustomed themselves to the fundamentals. The team is rounding into shape much faster than usual, and you can see the number of experienced players in the group.

Learn Signals Quickly

So far the players in the squad have had the experience of one season to learn the new style of play instituted at the beginning of last year, that no trouble has been experienced in teaching fundamentals and other fundamentals, coach declared.

The rather drastic amendment to the gridiron rules which will take effect this fall has made little difference in the playing style of the team, Robinson believes.

The prospects for the position of center looked rather dismal before the arrival of the return of Curry, probably the best guard on last year's team, revived hopes. Davis is being remade into a center, and will make a fine show to date. Last Friday he was the second team center on the '31 squad, is a prominent competitor for the position. So far, practice has shown two other possibilities, Cliff Sturtevant, junior, and Page Dill, a sophomore.

Guards Are Numerous

For the guard berths, Clate Burdick, a returning fullback man last year, and Jerry A. Johnson, who played various positions on the line, seem to be among the leaders at present. Both are let down by the absence of a third edge over Everett Dennis, who is entering his third year of football, and Kenneth Jones, the son of Bob Hart, brother of the quarterback. Hart is known himself as a guard and giving his opponents a great deal of trouble in scrimmaging.

It will be hard for the tackles this year to hold their own with Miller and McTolland, who held the tackle positions last year. Fred Cushing and Bud Lauskin, who are most fit for the position, tackles a good and dangerous team taking their turn with the first team in scrimmaging, lack at least some of the aggressiveness which put Miller and Lauskin's all-state squad and many McTolland's opponents fear him in every game.

A great deal of improvement is expected from both Cushing and Lauskin, however. The under-studies for the tackle roles are Guy Howard, Randall Kiddie, the Forrester brothers, Dick and Warren. All have shown some ability, and may be prominent members of the team before the season is over.

For ends, the two regulars of last year are both on the list, Bud Shadley and Harry Breckford, played almost the entire season on the first team. With a year's experience behind them, both are expected to distinguish themselves in the new system. Additional strength is available in Bill Miller, Fred Boynton and Bob Sabean, all whom played in some games last year, and Charles Miller and Vic Canver.
