Ball Carriers on Baldwin Team Promise Varied Style Of Play

This is the second of a series of articles on the Baldwin High School football squad, as set by Coach Miles W. Robinson.

The veracity of the candidate seeking positions in the Baldwin High School football team gives promise of the development of a varied style of play to cope with any defenses which the opponents may have. Coach Robinson declared in speaking of the backfield possibilities.

"We are fortunate this year in having a number of players who will be able to draw from a wide variety of positions. At least four of our backfield candidates carried letters as quarter backs in the last track season," he pointed out.

The average weight of the ball carriers is about 160 pounds, and some of the heaviest are the fastest.

"For a quarterback the choice will be made from Bunyan, McElroy, and Robinson. Bunyan filled this position during most of the St. Mary's game. He has had some experience from his year in calling signals and in steadily showing improvement.

"Although McElroy has good possibilities as a quarter back, he is a good ball carrier and may often play halfback.

"Schwarz comes from a football family, and Robinson believes he knows more about football rules than anyone else on the squad.

"Most of us must study and study the rules to become familiar with them. Fred is a gift. He can remember the technicalities by just reading them," the coach said.

When, like Schwarz, is light, but what he lacks in size, he makes up in hard driving and grit.

"Hunt is Best Fullback

In the fullback position, Hunt is the leading candidate. The only other year he has been in the game is a good line plunger, blitzer and punter, and is the probable choice for the position in most of the coming season.

The most prominent understudy in the position is Don Beusman, a soph and Steffen, juniors.

Guckelberg and Guckelberg seem to be the most logical choices for the fullback berth. Both are aggressive and have lots of grit. Guckelberg is one of the fastest players on the team. Donaldson and Doherty, the former also very speedy, are making strong bids as halfbacks.

McKee Looks Promising

McKee, a senior who played a year of varsity football in 1930, is expected to do a lot for the team this year. He has been handicapped by injuries received early in practice but is in uniform for the Post-Huron game Saturday. He vies with Guckelberg for "fastest" honor and has done fine work as a blitzer on the line. He is one of the heaviest on the team as well.

Priest, Russell, George Guckelberg and Gowans make up the remainder of the squad of backfield men.

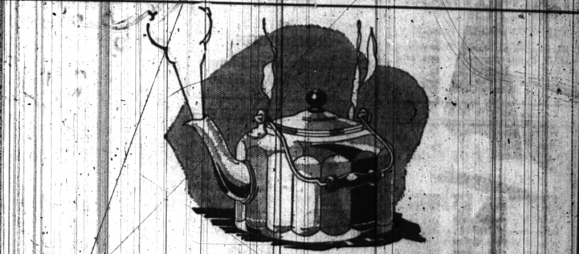

Inter-University System, Reduced In Size, Undergoes Reorganization

While the Cranbrook varsity grid squad is in the midst of its second week of practice, the inter-club program is being swung into action by Director of Athletics P. Thompson. Because of the fact that the enrollment of the school this year supplies not only a varsity football squad of 44, but also a varsity hockey squad of 39, the inter-club program is much reduced. The system has been expanded to include, instead of three clubs, two clubs with three days a week and one club with one day a week. The clubs should practice four days a week, but their scheduled games will probably start about the second week of October. The team which will remain intact throughout the year is hockey, basketball, and baseball. The organization of the system, the club known as the Quadrangles was dissolved and the Tower and Fountain clubs were retained.

The purpose of the varsity system which may not play any regular games this year, is to familiarize boys with the game before the school entrance next year into the Tri-State League of Shawnee, Pittsburgh, Nichols of Buffalo, and Cleveland University Schools. 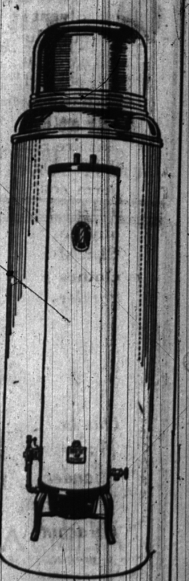
