First Meet For Point-To-Point Races Will Take Place At Metamora, Saturday

Always an event of interest to the sports-minded of this Hills and Birmingham are the annual point-to-point races of the Bloomfield Open Hunt Club, to be held this year at the Metamora Hunt, Sept. 16 and 17.

A year ago, four hunt clubs participated in the event, which this year will be confined to two—the Bloomfield Open and Metamora Hunts, with both meets at the latter club. Following luncheon at 12:30 at the Metamora branch of the Bloomfield Open Hunt, Saturday, the races will be held at 2 P. M. on the Alport farm course—three miles from Oxford.

Of the eight events on the program, the feature race is for the trophy presented by Frank J. Navin, president of the Central Racing Association. It will be run on a two-mile course over brush.

The first race will be over a one-quarter-mile course for regularly placed polo ponies, the second of a one-and-one-half mile course over brush; the third, one mile on flat surface, and the others, one-quarter mile, flat, one-and-one-half miles over brush for qualified hunters, and one-quarter-mile flat for horses owned and ridden by farmers or members of their families, residing in the vicinity.

California Bishop Is Visitor In Hills

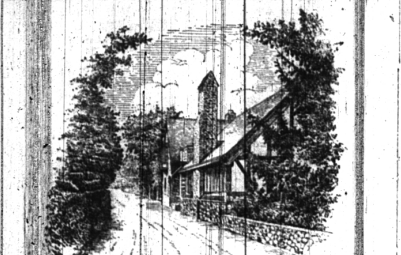
