Girls All Alike, Says Teacher From Sudan

Regardless of color, girls of the East and West are all alike, according to Miss Ruth Parks of 655 East 11th street, who returned from Egypt last week after two and one-half years as a teacher in the largest school for native girls in Sudan.

Miss Parks went to Africa in 1932 as a missionary for the United Presbyterian Church of America, and was stationed at Khartoum, where she taught English and Bible study in a school attended by 400 native school girls.

"There isn't very much difference in girls," Miss Parks said. "They are quite sure to reveal the same characteristics, no matter what part of the world they live in."

"For instance, when the girls first arrived at the school where I taught, they wore the native garb, a bright cloth, one-piece, Northern Hubbard style dress. But before they had been with us long they began to imitate the dress of the Western world."

"They were very much like school girls in Birmingham, where they did not want to be different from the others. I did not find them very much different, nor were they easier to teach than American school girls. They were of course, fundamentally children of the East, but characteristically, they were just girls."

Miss Parks will not return to Africa, she said, and has plans for the future. Before going to Khartoum she taught in various Michigan schools, including the Adams School in Birmingham. She was graduated from Baldwin High School in 1919, and attended the Michigan State Normal College where she received her A. B. in education.
