COMMUNITY FARM ENTERPRISE BEGUN

"Pioneers" Start Work On Project To Regain Self-Dependence
The Birmingham Pioneers, an organization of about 75 men listed on the city's welfare rolls, have begun active work on the co-operative farming project by which they hope to become partially, if not entirely, self-supporting.

Already 20 acres of land have been plowed, several fruit trees have been planted and a grape arbor has been cleaned out, according to City Manager James W. Parry, who is welfare director.

Appointed in 1922

A rest from his work was necessary in order to avert a nervous breakdown, he told the Commission.

Fire Levels House On Estate In Hills

Carlaker's Home On Property Of "St. Louis Dutch" Weinbrenner Burned
The caretaker's house on the estate of George "St. Louis Dutch" Weinbrenner, well-known operator of gambling establishments, was totally destroyed by fire at midnight Thursday, at an estimated \$25,000. The estate is on Quanton road near Cranbrook road in Bloomfield Hills.
The fire started the basement when a neighbor came to borrow gasoline from Sam Boucher, the caretaker, who engaged the man with his family. The two men began pouring the gasoline out of a 60-gallon drum under the light of an oil lantern, the flame from which ignited the flames.
The Birmingham Hills fire department was called, but the fire had gained such headway that the men were powerless to extinguish it. Weinbrenner's own home on the estate burned down in 1924, and was never replaced. Weinbrenner is said now to be operating in Kansas City, but he still visits Detroit about once a month.

Would Review Sections Of Fine; May Raise Speed On Part Of Woodward
An amendment to the city's traffic ordinance is expected to be adopted by the Commission Monday night, following a hearing held last Monday by Chief of Police John P. Hackett and a special commission composed of Hackett, Chief E. W. Oshorn, and Clarence Vliet.
It is presently proposed the amendment would raise the speed limit on Woodward avenue between 30th and 35th streets from 30 to 35 miles an hour, but its chief purpose is to provide for a traffic violation camera and to raise a revised schedule of fines for traffic offenses.
