

POLICE DOUBLE JUNE ARRESTS

51 Cases Involving 20-Mph Speed Limit Go To Court

Strict enforcement of the new 20-mph an hour speed limit on Woodward avenue and Brown street, reported by the Commission Monday night, was principally responsible for the fact that arrests made by Birmingham police in July were nearly double those of the preceding month. It is shown in the monthly report of Miss Carrie Stoddard, police clerk.

July arrests totaled 215, of which 108, or the entire number of arrests for June, were for speeding. Only 52 persons were arrested for speeding in June.

Nominal Fines
All cases under the 20-mph an hour limit were turned over to Municipal Court, where Justice Forbes S. Haswell handled 81 such cases. He assessed nominal fines of \$1 each whenever the defendant appeared voluntarily in court, and issued warrants for others.

Arrests in July besides those for speeding included three for felonies and 104 for misdemeanors. The felonies included one of breaking and entering, and two of simple larceny. Twenty-six persons were arrested for illegal parking, 71 for violating traffic signals, two for reckless driving, one on a warrant for another jurisdiction, and one such for drunkenness, indecent exposure, investigation and driving with improper license.

Three persons were injured in accidents during the month. Police received 107 calls and investigated 51 complaints. Seventy-seven homes were watched while their owners were away, and 17 cases were given a "right lodging" in the city jail.

Stolen Auto Recovered
A stolen automobile was recovered, and four cases of breaking and entering were reported, one of which was cleared by arrest and another of which proved to be unfounded. Two grand larcenies were reported, of which one was unfounded, and 103 simple larcenies. One of the latter was cleared by arrest, and the articles stolen in another were recovered. Fines collected at the Traffic Violations Bureau amounted to \$3102, as compared with \$250 in June.

Including the 51 cases involving the 20-mph speed limit, 64 cases concerned with violations of city ordinances were started in Justice Haswell's court during July, together with 18 civil suits, five garnishments, three trials and four cases involving violations of state laws.

Total fines and costs collected amounted to \$1463, consisting of \$29 in civil cases, \$9.65 paid by the county in state cases, and \$1434 in city ordinance cases.
