FALSE CARDING

FALSE CARDING consists of playing cards out of proper order. If the 10 is led through your J-Q-K, you false card if you play the 9. This is normal in the sense that you cover with the J. If well conceived, false carding often proves superior to opponents. Declarer has no partner to deceive, so he may more safely use deception in his play than the defender can risk.
