

CITY SURRENDERS TOWNSHIP'S NOTE

Will Accept New Security As Collateral Against Bank Deposit

Release of an \$8,000 Bloomfield Township note held by the City of Birmingham as collateral against its deposit in the First National Bank of Birmingham was approved by the commission Monday night, with the understanding the transaction will involve the payment of \$1,200 in cash by the township to the city.

The township had asked that the note be released to the commissioner, and other collateral be substituted for it, in order that the note could be offset against the township's deposit in the bank and that the 20 per cent dividend could then be paid.

The township has a balance of \$9,336.80 due on its dividend, which will not be released until the note has been offset. A large portion of the dividend is represented by school district funds.

City Treasurer Harold H. Corson recommended release of the note in a communication to the commission in which he said David E. Anderson, Bloomfield Township treasurer, had told him the township would be willing to pay \$1,200 to the city in cash. This amount would be applied against a \$200 debt owed by the township for rent in the Municipal Building before Birmingham became a city, and would also include \$1,000 of a \$2,429.68 debt owing the city from the township's highway improvement fund.

Commissioners E. W. Osburne and Frank S. Packard both voted releasing the note. Mr. Osburne said he believed the city should receive in cash at least the full amount of the highway im-

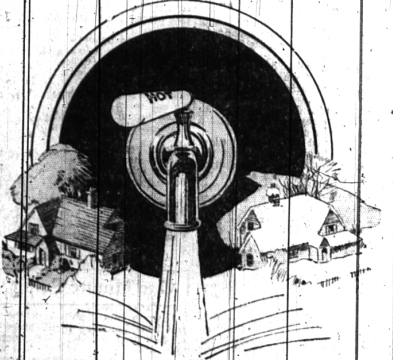
