 1 lb. butter 1 cup sliced  
 1 cup milk 1 cup flour  
 1/2 cup milk 1/2 cup butter

Add sugar, salt, pepper, milk, green pepper and onions to the corn. Put a layer of corn in the greased ramekins, sprinkle with breadcrumbs, then repeat layers until dishes are filled, having crumbs on top. Put the top of each ramekin with 1/2 lb. butter. Bake in a hot oven (400° F.) for 15 minutes.
