**2 Churches To Hold Annual
Christmas Services Sunday**

Traditional Christmas services will be held Sunday in both the First Presbyterian Church and Christ Church Cranbrook. The annual White Gift service will be held at the Presbyterian Church at 7:30 P. M. Each year the presentation of white gifts, which are later distributed to spread cheer and relief in the community, is made, following a portrayal of the Christmas story. This year a series of five tableaux prepared by members of the congregation will represent different episodes in the story.

Various departments of the Sunday School will assist in musical features of the service, but the tableaux will be presented by Adults. A committee, composed of Y. C. Smith, Mrs. C. F. Butters, Mrs. Glenn Coley, N. S. Grubb, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Woolfenden and Mrs. W. Clarence Wright, has collected properties intended to make the service effective.

Festival Of Gifts
The annual Festival of Gifts will be held Sunday at Christ Church Cranbrook, beginning at 4 P. M. Although arranged especially for boys and girls, adults are also included.

The service opens with prayers, the reading of the Christmas lesson in the chancel and the singing of old chants. Then from the

sacristy comes a procession of shepherds and wise men in costumes. They march down the center aisle toward the narthex and then up the north aisle toward St. Paul's chapel where the stable of Bethlehem is represented.

Arriving there, the shepherds and wise men give their gifts and pay homage to the Infant of Peace, then gather about the stable to form the picture of the first Christmas. The shepherds and wise men are followed by members of the choir, carrying old-fashioned lanterns and singing Christmas hymns.

Congregation Follows
The congregation follows the choir, also carrying gifts to the Christ Child in the manger. The gifts are afterwards collected and distributed at Christmas time to the proven needy.

The service will be preceded by a carillon recital by William Hall Miner, bellmaster of the church. His program follows:

Devotional group—"O Come, All Ye Faithful," "Joy to the World," "As with Gladness Men of Old."
Traditional group—"The First Noel," "We Three Kings of Orient Are," "Good King Wenceslas."

Narrative group—"O, Little Town of Bethlehem," "Hark, the Herald Angels Sing."

**DO NOT BURDEN
WORK ON CHILD**

His Play Hours Should Be His Own, Miss McCormick Says

A frequent mistake on the part of parents is to be too ambitious for the child. After a youngster has attended school for five or six hours he has a right to an hour or two of untroubled play. The period from the time he arrives home from school until his supper is served should be his own.

Unfortunately, many parents seize upon this playtime to load the child with music lessons, dramatic lessons, dancing lessons and other kind of lessons which, added to the time already spent in school, means that he works a longer day than most adults.

The result is that a child tends to feel nervous and fretful. He gets insufficient physical exercise. He is deprived of sunshine and fresh air and his health suffers.

Do not load your child down with outside studies. His school work is enough. If you are ambitious for his future, wait until he is old enough to take a personal interest in his career before you begin to force one upon him. His childhood will be gone soon enough. He should not be robbed of it.

For their health's sake, let your children do the things they want to do, providing their activities do not encroach on the rights of others. There are more educational opportunities concealed in commonplace games than parents realize.

**Library Issues 6,785
Books In November**

A total of 6,785 books were issued from the Baldwin Public Library and its branch at Pierce School during November, according to the monthly report of Mrs. Nancy B. Thomas, librarian. In November, 1932, when the library was open on a full time basis, 10,486 books were circulated. During the past month numbered 70, including 41 adult registrations and 29 juvenile registrations. The total registration at the end of the month was 5,406.

Only 27 new books were added, whereas 133 had to be withdrawn because of wear, the report shows. Ten of the new books were purchased, eight were gifts, and nine were transferred from the rental collection. The total number of books now in the library is 33,416, according to the report.

**65 M. P. H. DRIVERS
WILL FACE COURT**

Hereafter, motorists arrested for driving more than 65 miles an hour in Bloomfield Hills will be taken directly before Justice H. Augustus O'Dell rather than to the Traffic Violations Bureau, the City Commission decided Tuesday night.

The Commission amended its traffic ordinance, denying the motorists who travel more than 65 miles an hour the privilege of settling their cases by paying the regular \$10 fee at the Traffic Bureau.

Another amendment raised the Traffic Bureau fine for running a red light from \$1 to \$5. This was done on the recommendation of Justice O'Dell, who said he believed that offense to be more serious than speeding.

**CITY OF BIRMINGHAM
ORDINANCE NUMBER 284**

An Ordinance to amend Sections 3 and 4 of Ordinance Number 181 as amended by Ordinance Number 283 to amend Section 3A of said Ordinance Number 181.

The City of Birmingham ordains: That the Ordinance Number 181 as amended by Ordinance Number 283 of the City of Birmingham, which provides that any person who shall violate the provisions of said Ordinance shall be liable to a fine of not more than \$10.00 for each violation, be amended to read as follows:

Section 3. Upon application filed with the City Clerk, giving the full name and address of the applicant, and upon payment of the license fee hereinafter provided, the City Clerk or his authorized agent shall issue to such applicant a license in the form of a dog tag, which shall be valid for the term commencing on the date of the issue of such license and terminating the first day of January next following. Such application shall state the breed, sex, color and markings of such dog, and whether or not such dog has been immunized against rabies and the date of such immunization. If any, for each license the Clerk or his authorized agent shall at the time and before issuing the same, and for each renewal thereof, collect from each applicant a license fee of one (\$1.00) dollar for each male dog, one (50c) dollar for each female dog, and two (25c) dollars for each female dog, provided the application is made on or before the first day of March in the year for which the license is to issue, otherwise the license fee shall be Two (2.00) Dollars for each male dog or unspayed dog and Four (4.00) Dollars for each female dog.

Section 3A. Any person who shall keep or operate a kennel may, in lieu of the license fee hereinafter provided, make application to the City Clerk or his authorized agent for a kennel license, entitling the applicant to keep and operate a kennel. Such kennel license shall be issued by the Clerk or his authorized agent upon a proper form, and shall entitle the licensee to keep any number of dogs four months old or over, but such number shall not at any time exceed the number specified in such license. The fee to be paid for each such kennel license shall be Seven (\$7.50) Dollars and Fifty Cents for ten dogs or less, and ten (\$10.00) Dollars for each dog in excess of ten. Provided that a penalty of Five (\$5.00) Dollars shall be charged for kennel license applied for after the first day of March in the year for which the license is to issue, for a kennel established before the day last mentioned. With such kennel license the Clerk or his authorized agent shall issue a number of metal tags, equal to the number of dogs authorized by the license, each tag to be the same as those herein otherwise provided. Provided, that the provisions of this ordinance shall not prohibit the taking of dogs, which have been immunized, into this ordinance and have a kennel license outside the limits of the license temporarily and in leash, nor shall they prohibit the transmitting in conveyance of dogs temporarily for the purpose of breeding, trial or show.

Section 4. Any person becoming the owner after the first day of March of any year hereafter of any dog four months old or over, which has not already been licensed, or any person owning a dog which becomes four months old after the first day of March of any year hereafter, shall forthwith apply for and secure a license for such dog, which license shall issue without penalty in the event such application be made within thirty days after the applicant has acquired such dog, or such dog has reached the age of four months; and in case a dog is acquired or becomes four months old after the first day of July of any year, the license fee for such dog shall be one-half the amount fixed one annual license fee for each dog.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances contravening or inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon the publication after the passage thereof.
