Chorus of Musicale Heard In Fine Christmas Program

With the stately setting of Christ Church Cranbrook as a backdrop, the vocal soloists, members of the chorus of the Thursday Musicale and Mrs. Helen Wagner Neff, and Charles Hutton, soloists, gave a splendid performance Tuesday evening in the presentation of a holiday program.

To add to the impressive atmosphere of the occasion, the chorus appeared for the first time in public as a vested choir. The 35 members who appeared in deep wine colored robes, which fell in graceful folds, added dignity and beauty to the eyes and ears.

The clear notes of the carillon, as played by William Hall Mineer, opened the program. Following this, Dr. William Lloyd Ricketts presented a brief organ recital.

A professional of the chorus, singing "Hark, The Herald Angels Sing," formed an impressive opening for the vocal portion of the program. The harmony of the voices blended in the melody of the fine old hymn made the professional something long to be remembered.

The program consisted of choral numbers under the direction of Frederick A. Prothro and solo by Mrs. Heidt, formerly of Birmingham, and Mr. Hutton, who is the soloist at St. James Episcopal Church, Miss Harriet Ingersoll, Mrs. Howard Tuggey and Dr. Kemp assisted.

Particularly outstanding among the numbers offered by the Chorus were the Christmas cantata, "Christ's Nativity," by Harry Lykes, and the familiar "List The Cherubic Host" from the "Hoyle City" by Geal.

The simple beauty of the old songs, "O Little Town of Bethlehem" and "Joy to the World" was appealingly brought out, as the voices of the chorus rose in the same cadence.

Excerpts from Handel's oratorio, "The Messiah," offered an excellent opportunity for Mr. Hutton's splendid baritone voice. He was heard in selections from the "Prophecy" of "The Messiah," including "But Who May Expect the Day of His Coming," and the recitative "For Behold, Darkness Shall Cover the Earth."

Mrs. Heidt followed, singing soprano solos from the "Fullness" of the same oratorio, including the recitatives, "There Were Shepherds," "He Shall Feed His Flock" and "Come Unto Him." Her well trained, clear soprano proved well suited to the selections chosen.

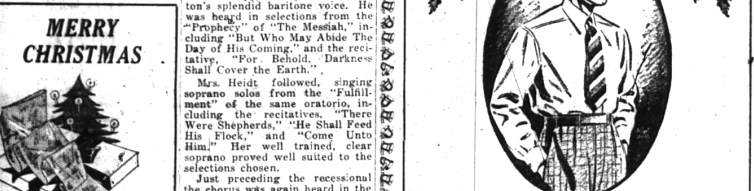
