Home Work Made Difficult By School Study Hall Routine

UP UNTIL about 1930 the trend had been toward a study hall toward a longer day. Pupils during several periods each day were herded into assembly halls, libraries or especially equipped rooms classed as study halls. A teacher was assigned to supervise this study hall, to police it. Usually there was a student helper in the afternoon.

Those who do may find it pretty late to develop study habits in the youth at home who never has learned there to follow a regular home study program.

Let parents of children in the elementary grades begin now to train these children in habits of home study, seeing to it that as early as the fourth grade each child on evenings before school shall, at a regular place, at a regular time, and for a regular brief period, without exception, apply himself to his studies in some other way than mental exercise—this not only for his school success but also for his character.

CONTRACT BRIDGE By E. V. SHEPARD FAMOUS BRIDGE TEACHER

COURAGE AND SKILL REWARDED
IN THE LONG run courage and skill receive rewards. The following deal illustrates how well a combination of those two virtues sometimes repaid.

Bidding went: South, 1-Club; West, 1-Diamond; North, 1-No Trump, to show his stops to the suit adversely held; and that he has strong support for a shift of make by his partner (North has no intention of playing the hand at not trumps with a void suit); South, 2-Spades; North, 2-No Trumps, sending information before reformation before assisting; South, 3-Hearts; North, 4-Hearts, now realizing that his partner holds five trumps and four hearts. This was bold bidding, even if East and West were able to vulnerable, and the bidders wished to even scores.

Every player at the table knew that he was practically void of clubs, if not wholly void; that he was stronger in hearts than in spades; that he knew that South held a 5-4-4-0 distribu-
