Griffith Lists 10 Suggestions For Curbing Holiday Blaze Hazards

In the hope that the coming holidays will be a "fire-free" season, Chief Griffith of the Fire Department yesterday issued a list of 10 warnings and suggestions intended to eliminate Christmas fire hazards and prevent possible loss of life and property.

"If the doctor has to be called," Chief Griffith said, "let it be for the boy or girl who has eaten too much and not for the child suffering from burns."

His list of fire prevention warnings follows:

1. Fasten Christmas trees firmly to the standard or hold them up by a chain.
2. Keep them a safe distance away from the fireplace or any open fire.
3. Keep matches away from children and trees.
4. Do not use tapers and candles on Christmas trees. Use electric lights.
5. Do not use cotton, wool, tissue paper or celluloid ornaments.
6. Use only metallic tinsel or other non-inflammable material. Asbestos fiber may be used for tinsel.
7. Never permit a child to play alone with any toy that requires an open flame or high voltage electricity without some grownup being with him all the time the toy is in operation.
8. Remember that when trees are cut they dry out rapidly and are liable to catch fire.
9. Dispose of trees not put them in the house.
