I have purposely made this menu very simple because the dessert is so hearty.

**White Fruit Cake**  
Four cups cake flour, one and one-half teaspoons baking powder, one-half teaspoon soda, one-half teaspoon salt, one-half pound each lemon peel, pineapple and red cherries, cut fine, one pound blanched almonds, chopped; one cup butter, one and one-half cups sugar, one tablespoon lemon juice, ten egg whites, beaten stiff; Sift flour, measure and sift several times with baking powder, soda and salt. Add one cup of the flour mixture to fruits and mix thoroughly. Cream or shortenage sugar gradually and cream together until of whipped cream consistency. Add flour mixture gradually, beating well after each addition. Add lemon juice, fruits and fold in stiffly beaten egg white. Turn into pans lined with heavy greased paper. Bake in a slow oven, 250 degrees Fahrenheit, for two and one-half hours, then increase to 300 degrees for remaining 15 minutes.
