THE JUMP assist frequently is the most useful and enlightening, especially when the opening bidder has made a minimum declaration, when there are slam hopes or when the side is vulnerable. It is probable that South never would have dared bid game on a simple assist by partner, and North might not have dared do so either, as North and South were vulnerable and East and West were not vulnerable.

Bidding went: South, 1-Heart; North, 3-Hearts, showing game expected, and asking for feature showing, which North would have checked had his partner been strong enough to comply. North had a vision of a slam, but East did expect game. East hoped to hold the declaration at a small loss or force the declaring side to overbid, when he put in his declaration of 4-Clubs. Although he held very little more than he had shown by his opening bid, North's jump assist so encouraged South.

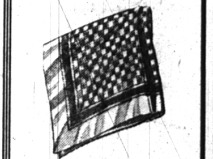
