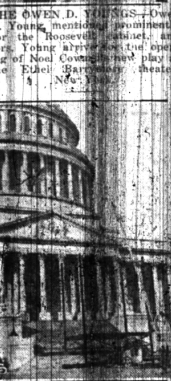

ed that way by their owners as a means of evading tax payments. Most of them, I believe, could be corrected and the delinquent taxes collected.

Would Necessitate Refunding
The bill if it becomes a law, will only encourage the non-payment of taxes, Mr. Moore believes, asserting that it will give property owners the notion that similar measures will be passed in the future to apply to taxes now coming due. All notes given by municipalities in payment of taxes as security would have to be refunded, he pointed out.

in Oakland county, the poor relief situation is so acute that if the bill is enacted into law, the reaction of the voters will be to create would force the county to set aside almost all available cash to meet the needs of the poor. Mr. Moore added. In this event, there would be no funds with which to pay approximately \$300,000 in general county obligations falling due this year, and they would therefore have to be repudiated, he said.
