

### YOUTH CENTER IS VISIONED

**Cranbrook Committee To Sponsor Varied Program Of Activities**

To make Cranbrook a center for a diversified list of activities for young people of junior and senior high school age is the purpose of a newly organized Junior Activities Committee, with Mrs. Lyman King of Oak Knoll Farms, Bloomfield Hills, as chairman.

The committee's program, designed especially to appeal to the young people of Birmingham and of the parish of Christ Church Cranbrook, already includes a schedule of classes in home-back spinning, dancing (Detroit), and little to be held in co-operation with the Cranbrook Institute of Science.

The riding classes will be held at the Woodhouse Stable, beginning next Saturday and continuing each Saturday thereafter from 10 A. M. to 4 P. M. There will be classes for both beginners and advanced riders, according to present plans.

The classes at the Institute of Science will also be held on Saturdays from 2:30 to 4:30 P. M. The first, scheduled for next Saturday, will be led by Victor H. Callahan, Director of the Institute, who will talk on "How to Mount a Bird." Dr. Donald T. Rice, entomologist of the class, and Mrs. Callahan will again address the class on Mar. 4, talking on "How to Mount a Small Mammal." There will be no charge for these classes.

The committee's plans call for classes in ballroom dancing to begin at Cranbrook on Friday, Feb. 24, and to be continued each Friday evening thereafter. The classes will be taught by Miss Evelyn Livingston Smith of Franklin, and each class will be followed by an assembly dancing.

The committee also plans to lead a group of young people on an inspection tour of the Detroit City Airport on Friday, Mar. 3. The tour will be followed by a dinner at the Guild Hall.

Whither goest Republicanism in Michigan? The answer to that very important question will be determined, for the immediate future, when the various county conventions are held throughout Michigan during the next week. From the "look" of the thing, it appears that two factions have developed, each centering very largely around the State Highway Department.

For instance, there is a group that believes Grover C. Dillman, present able and honest Highway Commissioner, ought to be nominated as the Republican Party's candidate for re-election; opposed to this another group, reported reliably to be composed of the McKay-Gillespie-Barnard-McKeighan followers, who are going to try to nominate one Manly S. Goodfellow, Ann Arbor contractor, to contest the office with Mr. Dillman.

Control of the Grand Rapids convention will be determined by the aggregate strength of both factions when county conventions are held next week. Reasons for seeking to control the Highway Commissioner's office are that it offers plenty of "patronage" for "the boys," as well as many jobs. ### NEW FORD V-8 CAR GOES ON DISPLAY

**Interest In Mechanical Features Of '33 Model Proves Public Motor-Minded**

The fact that the great majority of motor car owners—both men and women—are mechanically minded, was conclusively demonstrated Saturday when the new Ford V-8 cylinder, 112-inch wheelbase motor cars went on display in the showroom of E. W. Osborne, 808 South Woodward avenue, and in those of other Ford dealers throughout the vicinity.

The 75-horsepower engine, with its aluminum cylinder heads and rubber mountings, the new double-channel, double-drop X-type frame, newly designed head and coil lamps, bumpers and horn, skirtee front fenders, smaller wheels and larger tires appeared to attract fully as much attention as the new bodies with their flowing lines, distinctively modern design and luxurious interior appointments.

The new car is exceedingly flexible in traffic and capable of a sustained speed of 80 miles an hour on the open road. The secret of its power and alertness is said to lie in the improved V-8 engine and its new cylinder head design. Because aluminum dissipates heat more rapidly, the all-aluminum cylinder head permits unusually high compression pressure which results in increased speed, power and smoothness, unusual acceleration and fuel economy.

Mr. Haack is married and has two young children. He is the son of the late Lewis J. Haack, who was a life-long resident of Southfield and prominent in township affairs.

**Rev. Warner L. Forsyth Expected To Return Late This Week After Attending Duties**

Rev. Warner L. Forsyth, rector of St. James Episcopal Church, is expected to return late this week after attending funeral services in Baltimore, Md., for his mother, Mrs. Margaret Marshall Forsyth, word of whose death was received here Saturday.

Mrs. Forsyth was the widow of Rev. Robert W. Forsyth, D. D., who at the time of his death in 1910, was rector of St. Paul's Church in Richmond, Va., and Bishop-elect of Delaware.

She was a direct descendant of Chief Justice John Marshall of the United States Supreme Court, a renowned authority on jurisprudence.

Mr. Forsyth will resume charge of services in the church here Sunday.
