

Baldwin Basket Ball Social Suffers Third Defeat of Season

MT. CLEMENS TOPS MAPLES

Baldwin Five Shoots Poorly And Drops Rough Tilt, 23-20

Despite a hard driving rally in the first half, the Baldwin High School page team was unable to match the last playing of the Red and Blue of Mt. Clemens last Friday night and was defeated by the Baldwin City men on the Baldwin court, 23 to 20. Three defeats in seven games are now chalked on the season's records for the Maples.

The game was one of the poorest exhibitions of basketball the town has had since this season. The Mt. Clemens team, one of the toughest and heaviest, mauled the Baldwin boys.

BALDWIN PLAYS AT PORT HURON FRIDAY

The Port Huron High School basketball team will be the next foe to face the Coach Whitney's Baldwin High five. Only the first team will make the trip to Port Huron, where the game will be played on Friday night.

Last year, with both McKee and Crone out of the lineup because of illness, the Maples were not used in a hard fought game by the Fortners, 27 to 20.

The Port Huron game is the 11th on the Baldwin schedule. Only two games will remain after Friday night.

Aim Is Poor

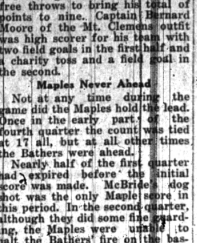
Whereas in the game the previous week against Grosse Pointe, the advantage of the Pointers could be offered as an excuse for the defeat of the Maroonmen, Friday's tilt was not lost, so much because of the superiority of the Baldwin City players as because of the faulty shooting of the Maples.

Coach Whitney's men attempted a multitude of long and short shots, long and over-heads, shots from the corners and one-handed shots, but the great majority of the possession were wide by just that fraction of an inch that counts.

Schwartz and Hunt went scoreless in the first half, and neither Forester, McKee nor McBride accounted for any field goals in the last two periods, although Forester and McBride each netted a foul shot.

Not at any time during the game did the Maples lead. Open in the early part of the fourth quarter the count was tied at 17 all, but as all other times, the Baldwiners were ahead.

Nearly half of the first quarter had expired before the initial shot was made. McBride's dog shot was the only Maple score in this period. In the second quarter, although they did some gearing, the Maples were unable to halt the Baldwiners' fire on the basket.

McKee gave the lead to the visitors again with a two-pointer from under the basket, and they were in throughout the rest of the game.

In the preliminary, the Baldwin reserves defeated the second team from Walled Lake, 38 to 23. Forester was high scorer with 15 points for the locals.

Although the weather is still cold and candidates are unable to get to school for practice, regular workouts for the new and old candidates started this week at Baldwin High School. The workouts for the next few weeks will be held in the Baldwin gym.

According to Coach Franklyn Whitney, the Maroon track hopes for the best they have been in the past three years. 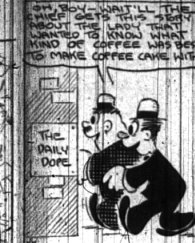

Other session rooms held short meetings with talks given by students.

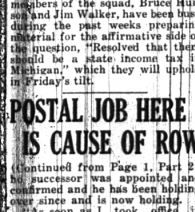
