THUG TRAPPED IN HOLDUP ATTEMPT

Paroled Prisoner Fails To Impress Intended Victim As Being "Hard-Boiled"

Because he did not appear sufficiently "hard-boiled," even though he had a prison record, Eugene Gean, 19-year-old Pontiac youth, is facing trial in Wayne County Circuit Court today on a charge of attempted robbery armed.

His intended victim was Clarence D. Hartuff, 348 Edgewood avenue, Birmingham, employee of the Oliver-Cadillac Company here, who refused to sign his car when the youth, gun in hand, commanded him to do so, but instead drove on until he could summon aid and bring about Gean's capture by police.

The youth walked into the Oliver-Cadillac Company Friday, announcing his intentions of buying a used car. He pecked out a model that he wanted and asked the salesman to drive him to Dearborn where, he said, he could get the money which he had for it.

The two had driven nearly to Michigan avenue on Telegraph road, Mr. Hartuff said. When Gean produced a pistol, jammed it into the driver's ribs, and commanded him to stop.

"He didn't look like a hard-boiled criminal," Mr. Hartuff said, "so I kept on driving a few blocks until I could see whether car approaching from the rear. I pulled over to the curb, got out and summoned the driver to stop.

The fellow with the gun got out on the other side and started running. We went to a nearby gas station and called police, who caught the thug a few minutes later.

The youth was bound over to Circuit Court after confessing to police that he had attempted to commit the holdup. He is said to have been on parole after serving part of a one-to-15 year sentence in Ionian Prison, and to have admitted a series of holdups since his release.

While we are in sympathy with anyone who has a good tree, yet neither we nor any want the abuse of public property to continue, the Road Commission officials, in its notice, added that the Commission is calling your attention to the above law by sending you this notice during this period of our trees so very valuable and beautiful, trees are being destroyed or injured thereby for the firewood they will furnish.
